PROLOGUE

The Factbook reports on and updates much of the data presented in the final Strategic Planning Committee Report (issued in June, 1990). In doing so the Factbook identifies the University's absolute position, and in many cases the institution's comparative position one year following the collection, analysis, and presentation of the data that was a part of the strategic planning process. There may be some slight inconsistency in the figures in a few of the charts (e.g., Fall Enrollment, 1990). This is a result of the timing difference in collecting some of the data for the Factbook.

The report makes a very positive statement about the University's current position in relation to its list of comparative colleges and universities. Appendices A and B, "Comparative Schools," located at the back of the Factbook, present in detail the general characteristics of the University's comparative college groups, plus the law school comparative institutions. What is not captured in this report is the success the University has enjoyed in reaching many of the Strategic Planning Committee Report goals endorsed by the faculty and trustees in the spring of 1990. Information concerning the status of the 109 identified goals will be included in a report to be issued during the spring term, 1991.

The Factbook, divided into seven sections, does not attempt to analyze the exhibits included in each section. A PROFILE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF RICHMOND

Founded in 1830 and chartered in 1840.

Type of Institution

- Private, church-related (Baptist General Association of Virginia), liberal arts and sciences, with divisions in business, law, and leadership studies.

Location

- Historic Richmond, the capital city with a population of 700,000 in the greater metropolitan area. The University maintains strong relationships with city, business, government, and cultural agencies.

Faculty

- 213 continuing faculty of whom 96 percent hold the Ph.D. or equivalent advanced degree

Student Body

- 3,359 total full-time enrollment; 2,829 full-time undergraduate (fall, 1990)
- 49 percent women; 51 percent men
- Undergraduate profile: 5,011 applications for 790 places, SAT score average in excess of 1200 for 1990 new students

Student-Faculty Ratio

- 12 to 1, undergraduate divisions

Student Life

- Five student government associations and more than 140 student organizations offering leadership opportunities
- Eleven social fraternities for men and six for women
- Campus recreation programs involve 75% of men and 60% of women each year

Athletics

- Division I athletic program offering nine sports for men and seven for women
- Major conference affiliations are Colonial Athletic Association (championships in 11 sports) and Yankee Conference (football)

Chaplaincy Program

- A chapter of Phi Beta Kappa was chartered at the University in 1928.

- T. C. Williams School of Law offers dual degree programs in Law/Health Administration, Law/Social Work, and Law/Urban Studies and Planning in conjunction with Virginia Commonwealth University, and a dual degree in Law/Business Administration in cooperation with UR's school of business
- Awards the B.A., B.S., B.M., B.S.B.M., J.D., M.S., M.Ed., M.H., M.S.M., and M.B.A.

Libraries

- F. W. Boatwright Memorial Library and three specialized libraries in music, law and science
- Current holdings include 372,200 volumes, 840,500 subscription periodicals, 98,100 microforms, 66,850 audiovisual materials

Alumni and Development

- 27,000 in 50 states with 66 percent in Virginia
- 30 percent contribute annually
- Total giving for 1989-90 was \$13,593,294



AGE DISTRIBUTION FULL-TIME FACULTY, 1990-91



The University of Richmond is classified as a IIA institution (Comprehensive Institution) in the AAUP's annual faculty salary survey. "These institutions are characterized by diverse post-baccalaureate programs (including first professional), but do not engage in significant doctoral-level education. ...these institutions must grant a minimum of thirty post-baccalaureate degrees and either grant degrees in three or more post-baccalaureate programs or, alternatively, have an interdisciplinary program at the post-baccalaureate level."¹

In 1989-90, 454 of 485 IIA Institutions participated in the survey, representing 96,973 or 27.8% of all faculty in the study. The largest number of faculty, 140,035, in the survey are at doctoral level (Level I) universities. There are about 53,000 faculty in the study at general baccalaureate (IIB) institutions.

The ratings (1*,1,2,3,4,5) used in the survey represent "the percentile Interval in which the Institution's average salary in a given rank lies (1* = 95th percentile or above, 1 = 80th to 94.9 percentile, etc.)² (Emphasis added.)





TEACHING LOAD - FALL, 1990



FALL, 1990**







GRADUATION SUMMARY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF RICHMOND STUDENT-ATHLETES

In 1986 the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) standardized definitions for graduation rates of recruited student-athletes. Each year since then the NCAA Academic-Reporting Form has been used to report this information. The graduation rate is to be computed on a period ending on August 31st following the fifth year after the recruited freshmen student-athletes enter an institution as full-time students. Two rates may be computed from this information. One rate allows the inclusions of student-athletes who transferred from the University in good academic standing with those who graduate. The other rate only considers the student-athletes who start and finish at the same institution in five years.

These figures reflect that 80% of all recruited student-athletes who enrolled at the University of Richmond during these four years graduated in five years from the University and that 95% of these same student-athletes either graduated or transferred in good academic standing. A comparison of the graduation rates of these student-athletes with graduation rates for the rest of the student body shows that 80% of student-athletes start and graduate from the University in five years while 70% of the regular student body graduate during the same period.



- to foster in students personal habits that contribute to health and physical fitness.

In order to achieve these objectives, the University is committed to:

- an educational environment conducive to the development of the whole person--intellectually, socially, spiritually, physically, and morally;
- an academic setting that guarantees and encourages freedom of thought, expression, and association;
