PROLOGUE

The 1991 Factbook reports on and updates much of the data presented in the 1990 Factbook and the final Strategic Planning Committee Report (issued in June, 1990). The document identifies the University's absolute position, and in many cases the institution's comparative position two years following the collection, analysis, and presentation of the data that was a part of the strategic planning process. Again this year, there may be some slight inconsistency in the figures in a few of the charts (e.g., Fall Enrollment, 1991). This is a result of the timing difference in collecting some of the data for the Factbook.

The report makes a very positive statement about the University's current position in relation to its list of comparative colleges and universities. Appendices A and B, "Comparative Schools," located at the back of the Factbook, present in detail the general characteristics of the University's comparative college groups, plus the law school comparative institutions. What is not captured in this report is the success the University has enjoyed in reaching many of the Strategic Planning Committee Report goals endorsed by the faculty and trustees in the spring of 1990. Information concerning the status of the 109 identified goals was published in May, 1991, as the Report on the Strategic Planning Committee Goals, and will be published again in May, 1992.

The 1991 Factbook is divided into two primary sections. The first section, "A Profile of the University," pages v to xx, presents a snapshot of several University characteristics. The second section, divided into seven parts, expands on much of the data shared in the summary, but does not attempt to analyze the exhibits included in each part.

A PROFILE OF THE UNIVERSITY

A PROFILE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF RICHMOND, 1991-92

Founded in 1830 and chartered in 1840.

Type of Institution

- Private, independent, founded by the Baptist General Association of Virginia.

Academic programs

- School of Arts and Sciences, The E. Claiborne Robins School of Business, Jepson School of Leadership Studies, The T. C. Williams School of Law, and University College

Location

- Richmond, the historic capital city with a population of 750,000 in the greater metropolitan area. The University maintains strong relationships with city, business, government, and cultural agencies.

Faculty

- 240 continuing faculty of whom 95 percent hold the Ph.D. or equivalent advanced degree

Student Body

- 2,883 full-time undergraduate (fall, 1991); 3,383 total full-time enrollment; 23 percent from Virginia
- 49 percent women; 51 percent men
- 1991 Undergraduate profile: 4,423 applications for 804 places, SAT score average in excess of 1200 for 1991 new students
- 1991 Law School profile: 2,108 applications for 160 places, LSAT score average of 41

Student-Faculty Ratio

- 12 to 1, undergraduate divisions

Student Life

- Coordinate, residential college with five student government associations and more than 140 student organizations offering leadership opportunities
- Ten social fraternities for men and seven for women
- Campus recreation programs involve 75% of men and 60% of women each year



ADMISSION

There is, perhaps, no clearer indicator an institution's perceived value and status than its record in the area of undergraduate admissions. Chart 1, "Undergraduate Admission, 1982-1991," portrays graphically the University's admission profile during the past ten years.

T. C. WILLIAMS SCHOOL OF LAW ADMISSION, 1987-1991




FACULTY

The real soul of any good college or university is to be found in its faculty. Three measures of the faculty's strength and vitality can be found in the analysis of its salary structure, the student-faculty ratio, and the faculty's activity in the areas of publication and grant application.

STUDENT-FACULTY RATIOS






Chart 6, "Faculty Activity in Grant Application, 1988-89 to 1990-91," displays the increase in the total dollars received in grants during this period of time.

FINANCE

Three of many financial factors that can be used to characterize a college or university's financial condition are presented in the following charts.

Chart 7, "College Costs 1987-88 through 1991-92," reports on the University's relative position to comparative college Groups I and II. Our position relative to price has improved with every institution over the last four years. Our percentage increase between 1988 and 1992 is fourth lowest, and all of these institutions have increased prices more than Richmond during that same period of time. This trend is one of increasing importance in these challenging economic times, and lets us know that the relative value of education at the University is excellent.



RATIO OF SOURCES OF INCOME, 1990









RATIO OF SOURCES OF INCOME, 1990







RATIO OF SOURCES OF EXPENSES, 1990



RATIO OF SOURCES OF EXPENSES, 1990







AGE DISTRIBUTION FULL-TIME FACULTY, 1991-92



The University of Richmond is classified as a IIA institution (Comprehensive Institution) in the AAUP's annual faculty salary survey. "These institutions are characterized by diverse post-baccalaureate programs (including first professional), but do not engage in significant doctoral-level education. ...these institutions must grant a minimum of thirty post-baccalaureate degrees and either grant degrees in three or more post-baccalaureate programs or, alternatively, have an interdisciplinary program at the post-baccalaureate level." (*Academe*, March-April, 1990, p.28.)

In 1990-91 464 of 492 IIA institutions participated in the survey, representing 97,855 or 27.4% of all faculty in the study. The largest number of faculty, 142,618, in the survey are at doctoral level (Level I) universities. There are about 52,000 faculty in the study at general baccalaureate (IIB) institutions.

The ratings (1*,1,2,3,4,) used in the survey represent "the percentile interval in which the institution's average salary in a given rank lies (1* = 95th percentile or above, 1 = 80th to 94.9 percentile, etc.) (Ibid.) (Emphasis added.)





TEACHING LOAD - FALL, 1990



FALL, 1990**







**GRADUATION SUMMARY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF RICHMOND
STUDENT-ATHLETES**

In 1986 the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) standardized definitions for graduation rates of recruited student-athletes. Each year since then the NCAA Academic Reporting Form has been used to report this information. The graduation rate will be computed on a period ending on August 31st following the fifth year after the recruited freshmen student-athletes enter an institution as full-time students. Two rates may be computed from this information. One rate allows the inclusions of student-athletes who transferred from the University in good academic standing with those who graduate. The other rate only considers the student-athletes who start and finish at the same institution in five years.

These figures reflect that 81% of all recruited student-athletes who enrolled at the University of Richmond during these six years graduated in five years from the University and that 96% of these same student-athletes either graduated or transferred in good academic standing. A comparable figure for graduation of these student-athletes with the regular student body reflects that the student-athletes have 81% who start and graduate from the University in five years vs. 74% for the regular student body during the same period.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The University of Richmond is an independent, privately-endowed institution of higher education that provides a comprehensive academic program for men and women. It offers the intimacy of a small university and the diverse educational opportunities that derive from undergraduate degree programs in the liberal arts and sciences and in business, as well as graduate and professional programs in law, business, and selected areas of the arts and sciences. The University also provides a variety of credit and continuing education programs to the larger community. Related to the Baptist General Association of Virginia, the University affirms its commitment to serve individuals of all faiths and persuasions, without regard to race, sex, age, physical handicap, or national origin.

The educational objectives of the University are:

- to cultivate in students the interest, capacity, and skills necessary for independent intellectual inquiry and life-long learning;
- to convey to students a representative portion of that body of knowledge that has accumulated and endured through the history of cultures;
- to encourage and aid students in the development of basic beliefs, values, and attitudes;
- to assist students in selecting and preparing for careers and for study in graduate and professional schools;
- to foster in students personal habits that contribute to health and physical fitness.

In order to achieve these objectives, the University is committed to:

- an educational environment conducive to the development of the whole person--intellectually, socially, spiritually, physically, and morally;
- an academic setting that guarantees and encourages freedom of thought, expression, and association;
- an undergraduate curriculum that requires mastery of essential intellectual tools, understanding of basic aspects of human culture, extensive knowledge of at least one area of study, and physical exercise;
- a faculty dedicated primarily to excellent teaching and dialogue with students, while remaining actively engaged in scholarly, scientific, and artistic creativity;
- a diverse, largely full-time and residential student body that participates in a broad range of University activities;
- the essential resources for learning, such as libraries, laboratories, studios, computers, and audio-visual facilities and materials;
- opportunities for social commitment and public service, internships, travel and study abroad, and other appropriate learning experiences outside the campus;
- a program of varied social, spiritual, and physical activities that provide occasions for growth, fun, and fellowship;
- an administration that preserves and enhances the University's environment and resources, and that represents the institution to the broader community it serves.
