PROLOGUE

The 1992 Factbook reports on and updates much of the data presented in the 1991 Factbook and the final Strategic Planning Committee Report (issued in June, 1990). The document identifies the University's absolute position, and in many cases the institution's comparative position three years following the collection, analysis, and presentation of the data that was a part of the strategic planning process. Again this year, there may be some slight inconsistency in the figures in a few of the charts. This is a result of the timing difference in collecting some of the data for the Factbook.

The report makes a very positive statement about the University's current position in relation to its list of comparative colleges and universities. Appendices A and B, "Comparative Schools," located at the back of the Factbook, present in detail the general characteristics of the University's comparative college groups, plus the law school comparative institutions. What is not captured in this report is the success the University has enjoyed in reaching many of the Strategic Planning Committee Report goals endorsed by the faculty and trustees in the spring of 1990. Information concerning the status of the 109 identified goals was published most recently in May, 1992, as the Report on the Strategic Planning Committee Goals, and will be published again in May, 1993.

The 1992 Factbook is divided into two primary sections. The first section, "A Profile of the University," pages v to xx, presents a snapshot of several University characteristics. The second section, divided into seven parts, expands on much of the data shared in the summary, but does not attempt to analyze the exhibits included in each part.

A PROFILE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF RICHMOND, 1992-93

Founded in 1830 and chartered in 1840.

Type of Institution

- Private, independent, founded in 1830 by the Baptist General Association of Virginia.

Academic programs

- School of Arts and Sciences, The E. Claiborne Robins School of Business, The Jepson School of Leadership Studies, The T. C. Williams School of Law, and University College

Location

- Richmond, the historic capital city with a population of 750,000 in the greater metropolitan area. The University maintains strong relationships with city, business, government, and cultural agencies.

Faculty

- 220 full-time faculty at the assistant level or above of whom 95 percent hold the Ph.D. or equivalent advanced degree

Student Body

- 2,889 full-time undergraduate (fall, 1992); 3,422 total full-time enrollment; 22 percent from Virginia
- 49 percent women; 51 percent men
- 1992 Undergraduate profile: 5,371 applications for 766 places, average SAT scores were in the 1200 range for 1992 new students
- 1992 Law School profile: 1,845 applications for 155 places, LSAT score averages in the 90th percentile

Student-Faculty Ratio

- 11.5 to 1, undergraduate divisions

Student Life

- Coordinate, residential colleges (Richmond College and Westhampton College) with five student government associations and more than 180 student organizations offering leadership opportunities

UNDERGRADUATE ADMISSION, 1983-1992




Chart 2, "T. C. Williams School of Law Admission," shows admissions results in the law school for 1987-92.

T. C. WILLIAMS SCHOOL OF LAW ADMISSION, 1987-1992




FACULTY

AVERAGE FACULTY SALARY BY RANK




Chart 5, "Student-Faculty Ratios," identifies graphically the University's undergraduate position in relationship to the averages of comparative college Groups I and II.

STUDENT-FACULTY RATIOS






Chart 6, "Faculty Activity in Grant Application, 1988-89 to 1991-92," displays the increase in the total dollars received in grants during this period of time.

FINANCE

Three of many financial factors that can be used to characterize a college or university's financial condition are presented in the following charts.

Chart 7, "College Costs 1987-88 through 1992-93," reports on the University's relative position to comparative college Groups I and II. Our position relative to price has improved with all but one institution over the last five years. Our percentage increase between 1987-88 and 1992-93 is fourth lowest, and all but one of these institutions have increased prices more than Richmond during that same period of time.

Chart 8, "Total Charges at Virginia Institutions (Members of VFIC)," identifies the University's position relative to the Commonwealth's other private institutions. We continue to rank 10th in total costs among Virginia private institutions. Though our increase last year was slightly above the average, it did not change our relative price position among the VFIC. Three selective public institutions with whom the University competes for students are included.



RATIO OF SOURCES OF INCOME, 1991



RATIO OF SOURCES OF INCOME, 1991 (continued)







RATIO OF SOURCES OF EXPENSES, 1991



RATIO OF SOURCES OF EXPENSES, 1991 (continued)







AGE DISTRIBUTION FULL-TIME FACULTY, 1992-1993



The University of Richmond is classified as a IIA institution (Comprehensive Institution) in the AAUP's annual faculty salary survey. "These institutions are characterized by diverse post-baccalaureate programs (including first professional), but do not engage in significant doctoral-level education. ...these institutions must grant a minimum of thirty post-baccalaureate degrees and either grant degrees in three or more post-baccalaureate programs or, alternatively, have an interdisciplinary program at the post-baccalaureate level." (Academe, March-April, 1992, p.32.)

In 1991-92 453 of 477 IIA institutions participated in the survey, representing 98,588 or 27.6% of all faculty in the study. The largest number of faculty, 143,589, in the survey are at doctoral level (Level I) universities. There are over 53,000 faculty in the study at general baccalaureate (IIB) institutions.

The ratings (1*,1,2,3,4,) used in the survey represent "the percentile interval in which the institution's average salary in a given rank lies (1* = 95th percentile or above, 1 = 80th to 94.9 percentile, etc.) (*Ibid.*) (Emphasis added.)





TEACHING LOAD - FALL, 1990**



FALL, 1990**





ORGANIZATIONS SCHEDULING CAMPUS VISITS 1978-1992



**GRADUATION SUMMARY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF RICHMOND
STUDENT-ATHLETES**

In 1986 the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) standardized definitions for graduation rates of recruited student-athletes. Each year until 1991 this NCAA Academic-Reporting Form was used to report this information. The graduation rate was computed on a period ending on August 31st following the fifth year after the recruited freshmen student-athletes enter an institution as full-time students. Two rates were computed from this information. One rate allowed the inclusion of student-athletes who transferred from the University in good academic standing with those who graduate. The other rate only considered the student-athletes who started and finished at the University in five years.

These figures reflect that 81% of all recruited student-athletes who enrolled at the University of Richmond during these six years (1980-81 to 1985-86) graduated in five years from the University and that 96% of these same student-athletes either graduated or transferred in good academic standing. A comparable figure for graduation of these student-athletes with the regular student body reflects that the student-athletes have 81% who start and graduate from the University in five years vs. 74% for the regular student body during the same period.

In 1991 the NCAA changed to the Graduation-Rates Disclosure Form. This change aligned the NCAA reporting with legislation that was pending in Congress. The major differences between the NCAA's 1986 and 1991 forms are: (a) a shift from an emphasis in Recruited Student-Athletes to an emphasis on Freshman Student-Athletes Who Receive Athletics Related Aid, (b) a shift from totals for men's and women's sports to enrollment information on student-athletes who received athletics aid, by racial or ethnic group, by gender and by sport group and (c) a shift from graduation rates for recruited student-athletes who graduated in five years to the graduation rates for athletes who received athletics aid in their first year at the University who graduated in six, seven or eight years. It is not possible to make a meaningful comparison between the information in the NCAA Academic-Reporting Forms from 1986 through 1990 and the Graduation-Rates Disclosure Forms starting with 1991. The information in the OFFICIAL NCAA 1991-92 GRADUATION-RATES REPORT provides information on student-athletes entering in 1983 and 1984. This information was already reported in the NCAA Academic-Reporting Form for 1990. Each NCAA Division I institution has an OFFICIAL NCAA 1991-92 GRADUATION-RATES REPORT prepared by NCAA, based on data provided by the institution, in compliance with NCAA legislation and the Federal Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act. The University is required to distribute these reports to prospective student-athletes and others, as specified by NCAA legislation. NCAA further stipulates, "that a member institution is not permitted to alter or highlight the information contained in the report prepared by the Association [THE NCAA NEWS, Legislative Assistance Column No. 28, page 24, August 5, 1992]."

- to foster in students personal habits that contribute to health and physical fitness.

In order to achieve these objectives, the University is committed to:

- an educational environment conducive to the development of the whole person--intellectually, socially, spiritually, physically, and morally;
- an academic setting that guarantees and encourages freedom of thought, expression, and association;
- an undergraduate curriculum that requires mastery of essential intellectual tools, understanding of basic aspects of human culture, extensive knowledge of at least one area of study, and physical exercise;
- a faculty dedicated primarily to excellent teaching and dialogue with students, while remaining actively engaged in scholarly, scientific, and artistic creativity;
- a diverse, largely full-time and residential student body that participates in a broad range of University activities;
- the essential resources for learning, such as libraries, laboratories, studios, computers, and audio-visual facilities and materials;
- opportunities for social commitment and public service, internships, travel and study abroad, and other appropriate learning experiences outside the campus;
- a program of varied social, spiritual, and physical activities that provide occasions for growth, fun, and fellowship;
- an administration that preserves and enhances the University's environment and resources, and that represents the institution to the broader community it serves.
