



Profile of the University

The campus consists of some fifty major buildings, of impressive Collegiate Gothic architectural style, set amid 350 acres of lawns, lakes, and woodlands. Richmond's history began almost two centuries ago with Richmond College, founded in 1830 by Virginia Baptists as a college of liberal arts and sciences for men. Around this nucleus were established The T.C. Williams School of Law (1870); Westhampton College, a college of liberal arts and sciences for women (1914); the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, for advanced study in the liberal arts and sciences (1921); The E. Claiborne Robins School of Business, for undergraduate and graduate study in business (1949); University College, for evening, summer, and continuing education (1962), now called the School of Continuing Studies; and the Jepson School of Leadership Studies, the first school of leadership studies in the United States (1989). In 1990, the academic missions of Richmond College and Westhampton College were combined to create the School of Arts and Sciences. Richmond College and Westhampton College continue as residential colleges for men and women respectively, providing special programming and leadership opportunities in student life.

Richmond benefits from a heritage of ethical values, a residential character, and a commitment to liberal and general education opportunities through intimate schools and colleges joined into a substantial whole.

Statement of Purpose

The University of Richmond is an independent, privately-endowed institution of higher education that provides a comprehensive academic program for men and women. It offers the intimacy of a small university and the diverse educational opportunities that derive from undergraduate degree programs in the liberal arts and sciences, business, and leadership studies, as well as graduate and professional programs in law, business, and selected areas of the arts and sciences. The University also provides a variety of credit and continuing education programs as well as cultural events to the larger community. Historically related to the Baptist General Association of Virginia, the University affirms its commitment to serve individuals of all faiths and persuasions.

The educational objectives of the University are:

- to cultivate in students the interest, capacity, and skills necessary for independent intellectual inquiry and life-long learning;
- to convey to students a representative portion of that body of knowledge that has accumulated and endured through the history of world cultures;
- to encourage and aid students in the development of basic beliefs, values, and attitudes, including those of cooperation and tolerance;
- to assist students in selecting and preparing for careers and for study in graduate and professional schools;
- to foster in students personal habits that contribute to health and physical fitness.

In order to achieve these objectives, the University is committed to:

- an educational environment conducive to the development of the whole personintellectually, socially, spiritually, physically, and morally;
- an academic setting that guarantees and encourages freedom of thought, expression, and association;

an undergraduate curriculum that requires mastery of essential intellectual tools, awareness
of the diversity of human cultural experiences, extensive knowledge of at least one area of
study, and opportunities for interdisciplinary and integrative inquiry;

a faculty dedicated to excellent teaching and dialogue with students, and active engagement

in scholarship, scientific inquiry, and artistic creativity;

 a diverse, largely full-time and residential student body that participates in a broad range of University activities including opportunities for research, leadership, and the development of civic responsibility;

the essential resources for learning, such as libraries, laboratories, studios, information and

communications technology, and media resources;

 opportunities for internships, social commitment and public service, and other domestic and international learning experiences;

a program of varied social, spiritual, and physical activities that provide occasions for

growth, fun, and fellowship;

• an administration and staff that preserve and enhance the University's environment and resources, and that represent the institution to the broader community it serves.

Organizations and Accreditation

Five academic schools and two residential colleges are incorporated to form the University of Richmond with authority and responsibility vested legally in the Board of Trustees and the President of the University. The several colleges and schools award no degrees individually, but all degrees for work done in any one of them are conferred by the University of Richmond.

The University enrolls approximately 2,900 full-time undergraduates, 93% of whom live on campus; some 500 full-time law and graduates students; and 1,300 part-time students, largely from Richmond and the surrounding community.

The University is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award associate, baccalaureate, master, and juris doctor degrees. The University is also certified by the Virginia State Board of Education to offer teacher licensure programs. Various departments and divisions have more specialized accreditation. Included in this category are the music program, accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music, and the chemistry program, accredited by the American Chemical Society. In addition, The E. Claiborne Robins School of Business is accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools and Business at the undergraduate and graduate levels, and The T.C. Williams School of Law is accredited by the American Bar Association.

Student Life




Fall Undergraduate Enrollment By Race, 1997-2001 (Arts and Sciences, Business and Leadership Studies only)



2001 Enrollment by Ethnic Groups



University of Richmond Student/Faculty Ratios, Fall 1997-2001



First-Year Student Retention Rate, 1996-2000





Undergraduates Receiving Academic Honors, 1992-2001








Placement of Class of Those Responding (85.1%)





Full-Time Undergraduate Faculty by Gender, Fall 2001






Dollars Received and Number of Applications Funded



Comparison of University of Richmond Required Fees to Average of Other Institutions



Total Operating Revenues, 1997-98 to 2000-01






