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Profile of the University

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Environment and History of University of Richmond

The campus consists of some fifty major buildings, of impressive Collegiate Gothic architectural style, set amid 350 acres of lawns, lakes, and woodlands. Richmond's history began almost two centuries ago with Richmond College, founded in 1830 by Virginia Baptists as a college of liberal arts and sciences for men. Around this nucleus were established The T.C. Williams School of Law (1870); Westhampton College, a college of liberal arts and sciences for women (1914); the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, for advanced study in the liberal arts and sciences (1921); The E. Claiborne Robins School of Business, for undergraduate and graduate study in business (1949); University College, for evening, summer, and continuing education (1962), now called the School of Continuing Studies; and the Jepson School of Leadership Studies, the first school of leadership studies in the United States (1989). In 1990, the academic missions of Richmond College and Westhampton College were combined in a separate school, the School of Arts and Sciences. Richmond College and Westhampton College are the coordinate colleges for men and women respectively, providing special programming and leadership opportunities in student life.

Richmond benefits from a heritage of ethical and religious values, a residential character, and a commitment to liberal and general education opportunities through intimate schools and colleges joined into a substantial whole.

Statement of Purpose

The University of Richmond is an independent, privately-endowed institution of higher education that provides a comprehensive academic program for men and women. It offers the intimacy of a small university and the diverse educational opportunities that derive from undergraduate degree programs in the liberal arts and sciences, business and leadership studies as well as graduate and professional programs in law, business, and selected areas of the arts and sciences. The University also provides a variety of credit and continuing education programs as well as cultural events to the larger community.

The educational objectives of the University are to:

- cultivate in students the interest, capacity, and skills necessary for independent intellectual inquiry and life-long learning;
- convey to students a representative portion of that body of knowledge that has accumulated and endured through the history of world cultures;
- encourage and aid students in the development of basic beliefs, values, and attitudes, including those of cooperation and tolerance;
- assist students in selecting and preparing for careers and for study in graduate and professional schools;
- foster in students personal habits that contribute to health and physical fitness.

In order to achieve these objectives, the University is committed to:

- an educational environment conducive to the development of the whole person--intellectually, socially, spiritually, physically, and morally;
- an academic setting that guarantees and encourages freedom of thought, expression, and association;

- an undergraduate curriculum that requires mastery of essential intellectual tools, awareness of the diversity of human cultural experiences, extensive knowledge of at least one area of study, and opportunities for interdisciplinary and integrative inquiry;
- a faculty dedicated to excellent teaching and dialogue with students, and active engagement in scholarship, scientific inquiry, and artistic creativity;
- a diverse, largely full-time and residential student body that participates in a broad range of University activities including opportunities for research, leadership, and the development of civic responsibility;
- the essential resources for learning, such as libraries, laboratories, studios, information and communications technology, and media resources;
- opportunities for internships, social commitment and public service, and other domestic and international learning experiences;
- a program of varied social, spiritual, and physical activities that provide occasions for growth, fun, and fellowship;
- an administration and staff that preserve and enhance the University's environment and resources, and that represent the institution to the broader community it serves.

Organizations and Accreditation

Five academic schools and two coordinate colleges to form the University of Richmond with authority and responsibility vested legally in the Board of Trustees and the President of the University. The several colleges and schools award no degrees individually, but all degrees for work done in any one of them are conferred by the University of Richmond.

The University enrolls approximately 2,900 full-time undergraduates, 92% of whom live on campus; some 500 full-time law and graduates students; and 1300 part-time students, largely from Richmond and the surrounding community.

The University is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (1866 Southern Lane, Decatur, GA 30033-4097; Telephone 404-679-4501) to award associate, baccalaureate, master, and juris doctor degrees. The University is also certified by the Virginia State Board of Education to offer teacher licensure programs. Various departments and divisions have more specialized accreditation. Included in this category are the music program, accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music, and the chemistry program, accredited by the American Chemical Society. In addition, The E. Claiborne Robins School of Business is accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business at the undergraduate and graduate levels, and The T.C. Williams School of Law is accredited by the American Bar Association.

- 2002 Law School profile: 1,864 applications for 178 places, LSAT at the 75th %ile-160 (86th %ile); LSAT at the 25th %ile-157 (71st %ile)
- 680 part-time and 111 full-time students enrolled in the School of Continuing Studies

Student-Faculty Ratio

- 9.4 to 1, undergraduate divisions (fall 2002)

Degrees and Majors

- 64 undergraduate fields and preprofessional/interdisciplinary programs in the School of Arts and Sciences, The E. Claiborne Robins School of Business, and the Jepson School of Leadership Studies; five master's degrees in the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences; and a M.B.A. program in The E. Claiborne Robins School of Business
- The Richmond School of Law offers dual degree programs in Law/Health Administration, Law/Social Work, and Law/Urban Studies and Planning in conjunction with Virginia Commonwealth University, and dual degrees in Law/Business Administration in cooperation with Richmond's school of business and Law/Master programs in cooperation with the school of arts and sciences.
- The School of Continuing Studies offers five programs at the Bachelor's and Associate's levels, ten at the certificate level, two graduate certificates, plus nine minors in addition to numerous non-credit offerings.
- Awards the B.A., B.S., B.S.B.A., B.A.S., B.L.A., J.D., M.A., M.S., M.L.A., and M.B.A.

Student Life

- Coordinate college structure (Richmond College and Westhampton College) with five student government associations and approximately 200 student organizations offering leadership opportunities
- Eight social fraternities for men and eight for women (six National Panhellenic Conference recognized; two National Panhellenic Council recognized)
- Campus recreation programs involve 90 percent of men and women each year
- Approximately two-thirds of University of Richmond undergraduates are involved in volunteer service activities
- University of Richmond students and the University's chapter for Habitat for Humanity have raised more money than any other college or university in the nation

Athletics

- Division I athletic program offering nine sports for men and ten for women
- Major conference affiliation is the Atlantic 10 for all sports except for women's golf, which has a conference association with the Colonial Athletic Association.

Chaplaincy Program

- The Jessie Ball duPont endowed Chaplaincy located in the E. Carlton Wilton Center for Interfaith Ministries
- Weekly worship celebrations and pastoral care and counseling for students, faculty, and staff are provided
- Thirteen different religious organizations coordinated through the Chaplaincy program
- The Bonner Scholars program of up to 100 students provide campus leadership in community service along with other service initiatives such as the Annual Community Service Day, Community Partners, Habitat for Humanity, tutoring and mentoring programs, etc.

- University of Richmond ranks 39th (June 2002) in value of endowment among a national survey of 3,000 colleges and universities

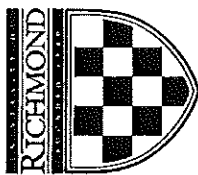

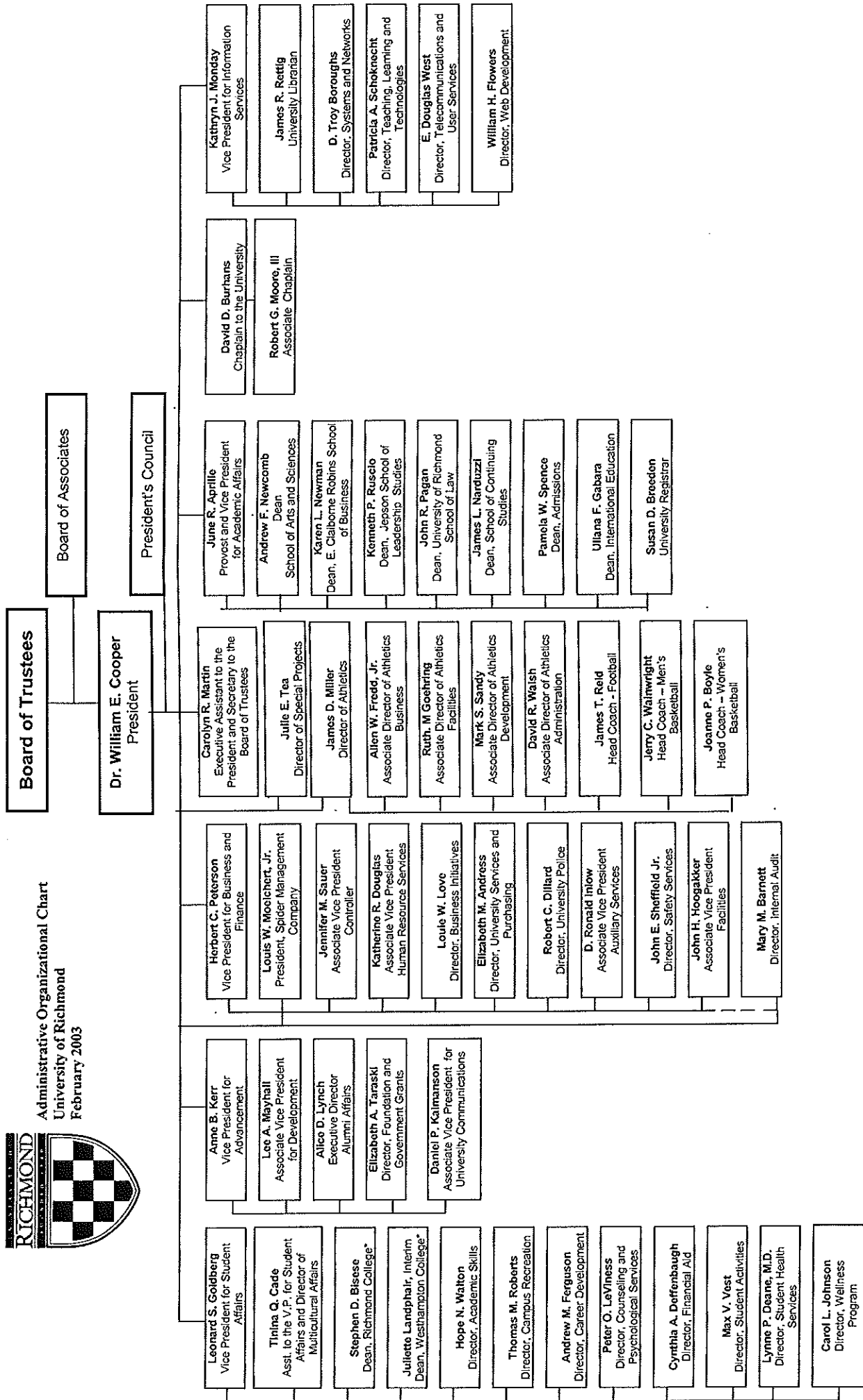

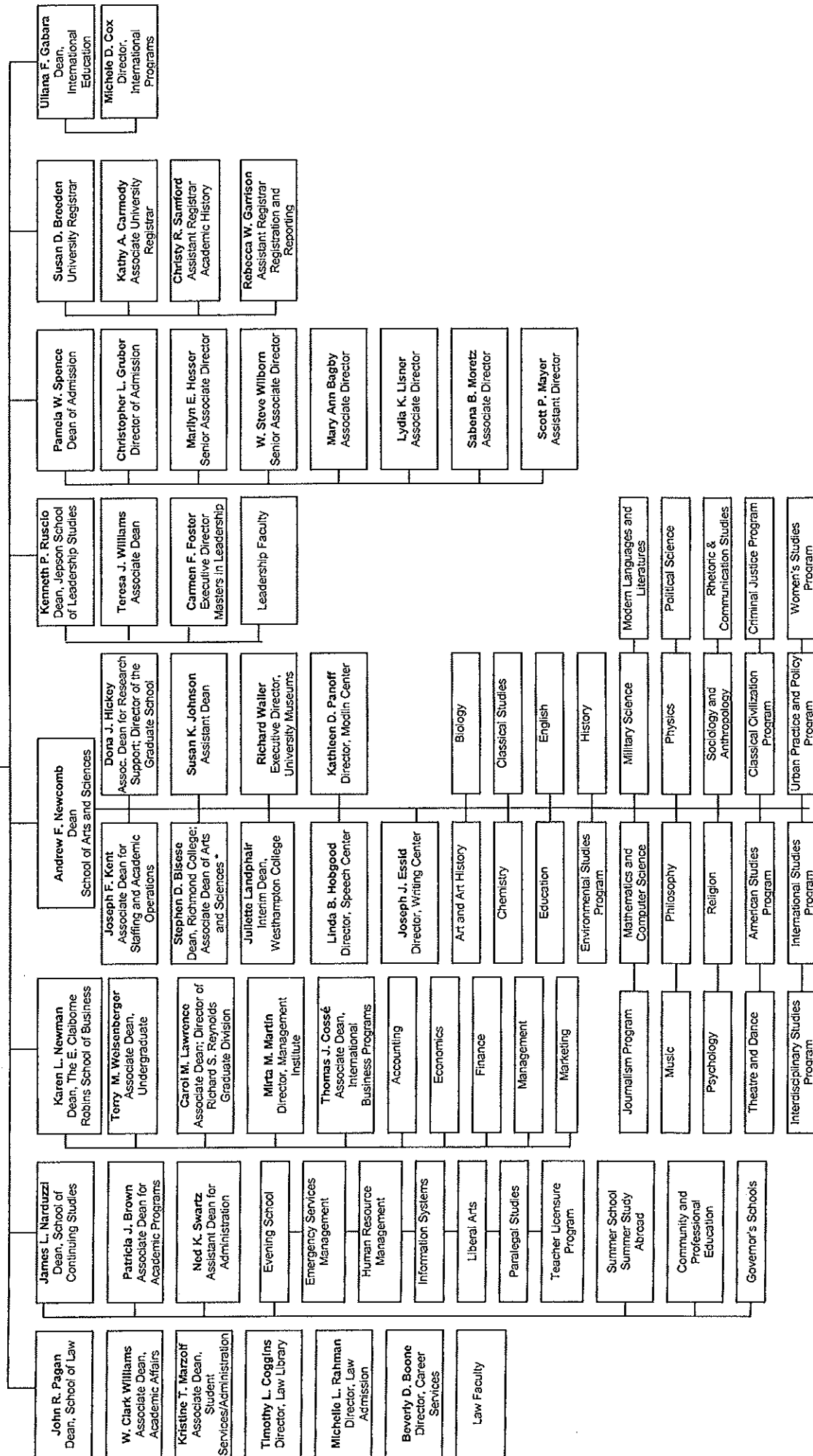


Academic Organizational Chart

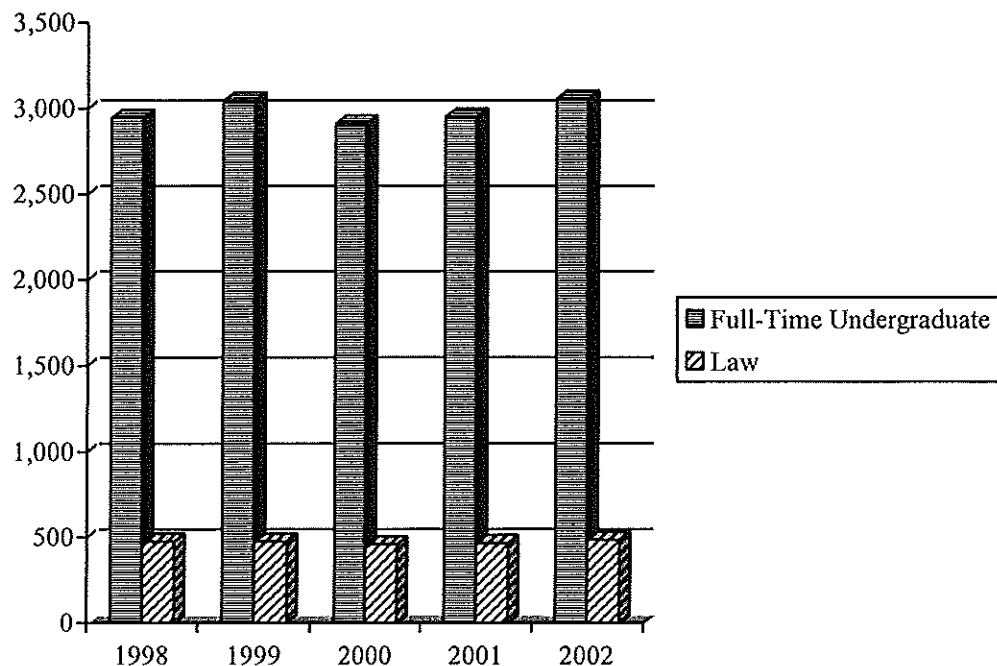

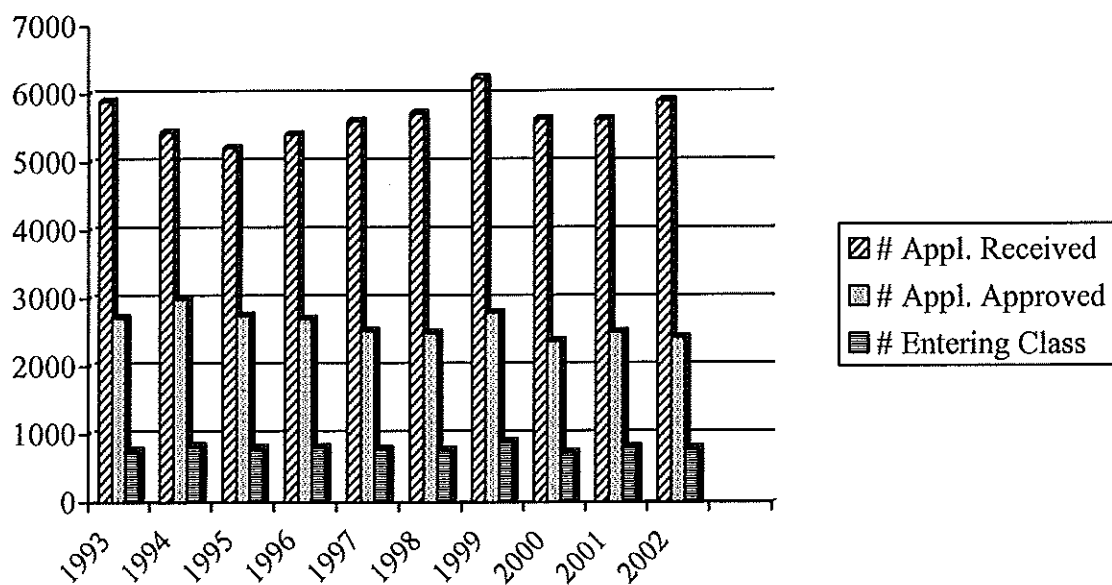

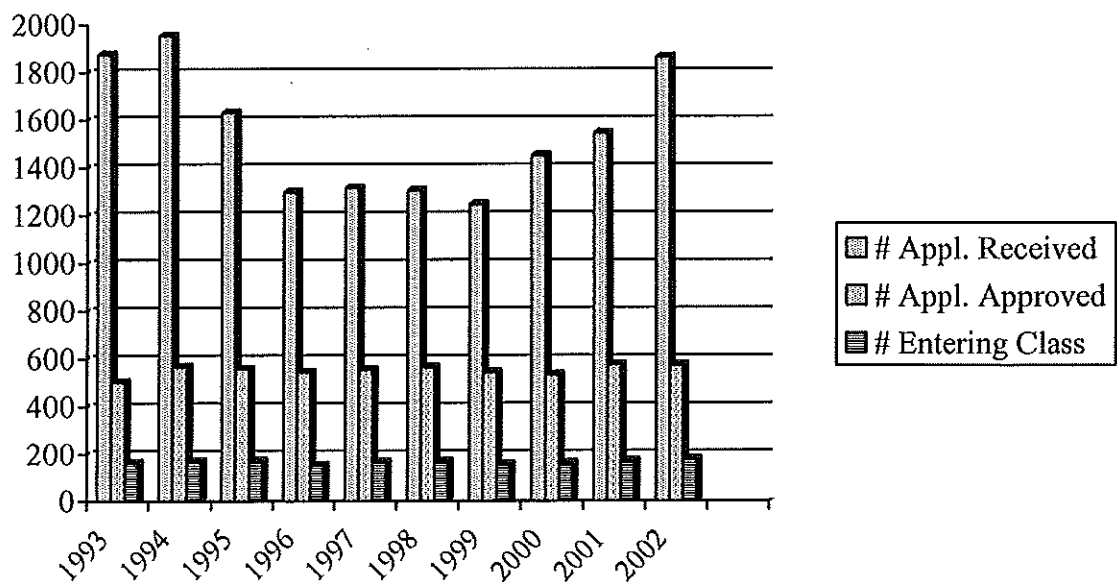

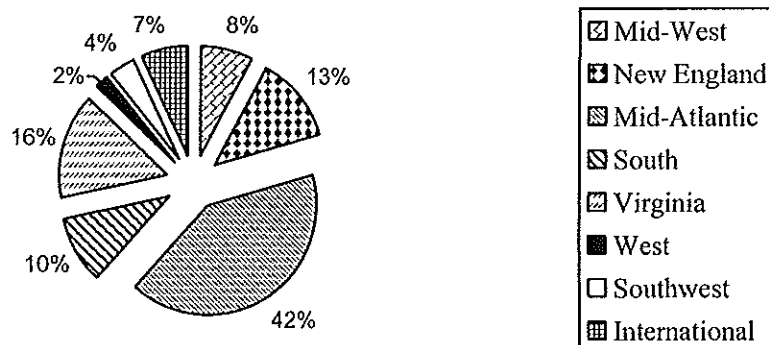

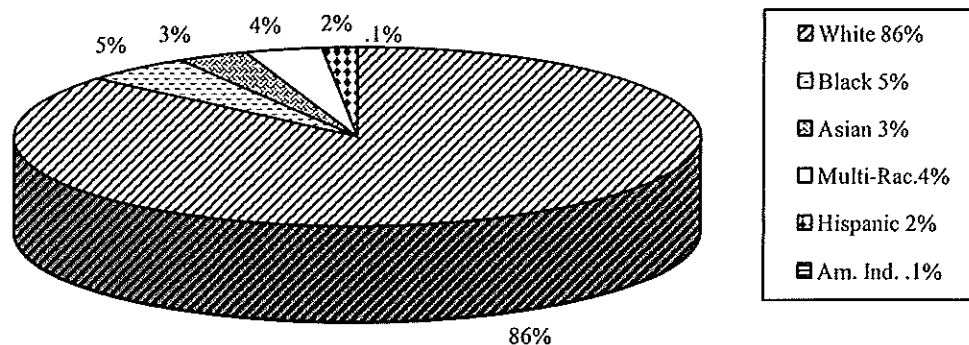

2002 Enrollment by Ethnic Groups

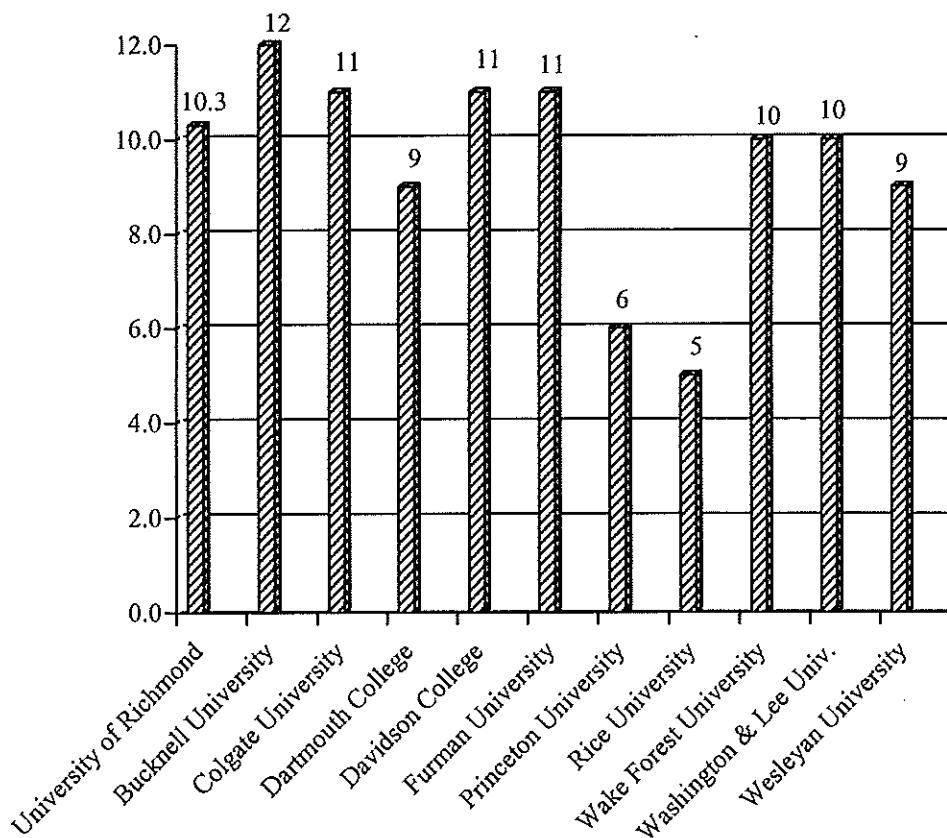

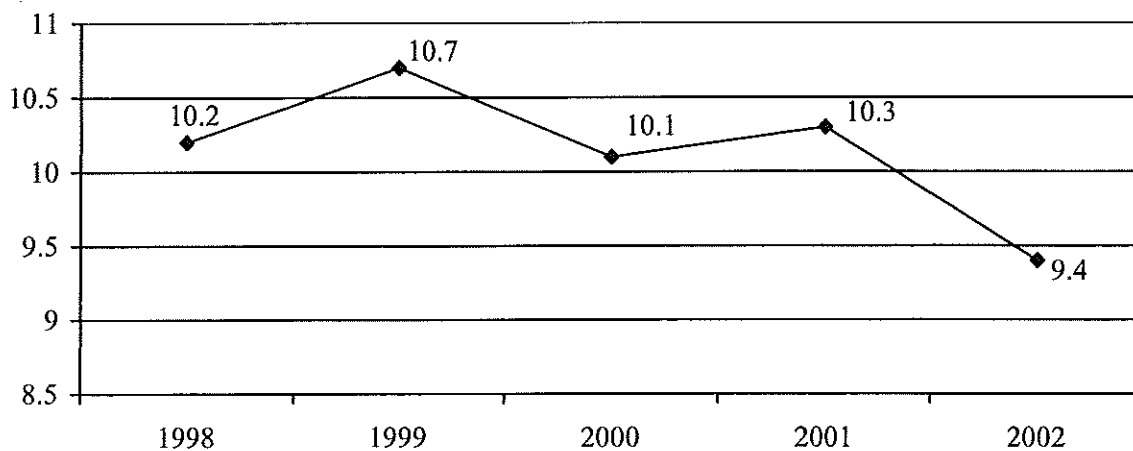
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Student/Faculty Ratios, Fall 2001



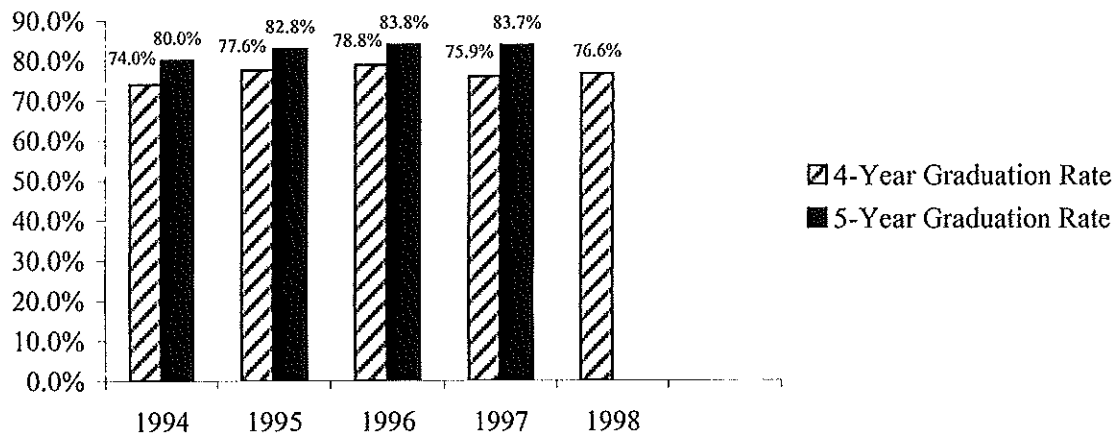

University of Richmond Student/Faculty Ratios, Fall 1998-2002



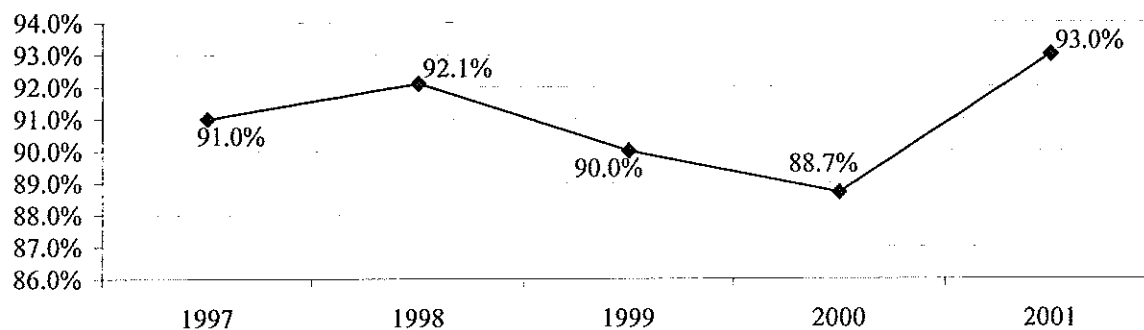

First-Year Student Retention Rate, 1997-2001

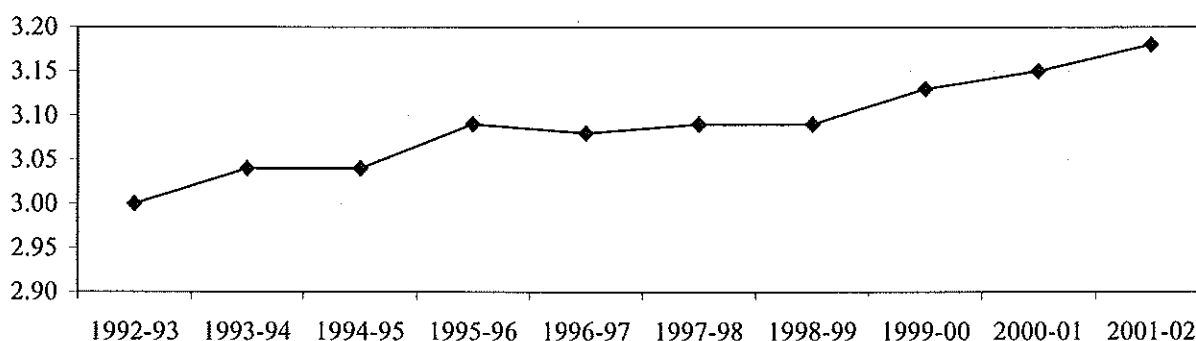

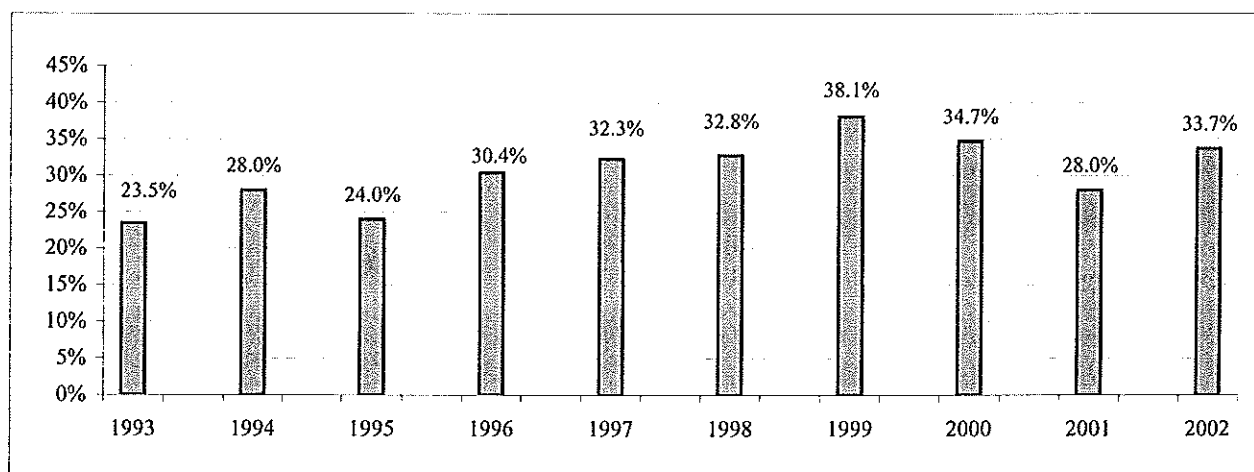

Min. criteria for A&S and Leadership: cum laude - 3.40, magna cum laude - 3.60, summa cum laude - 3.80

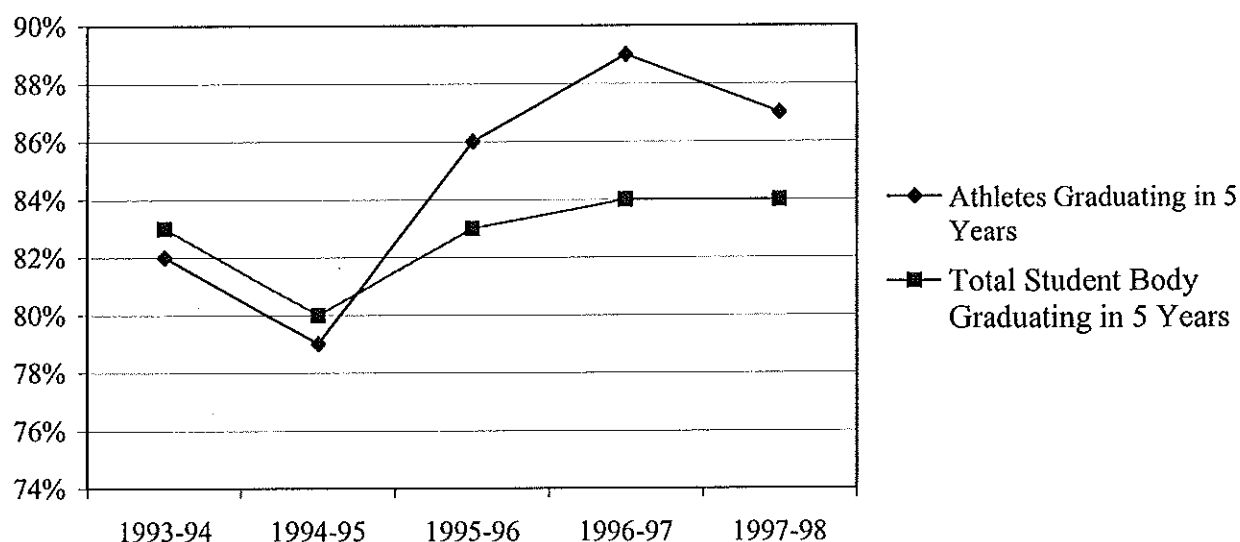

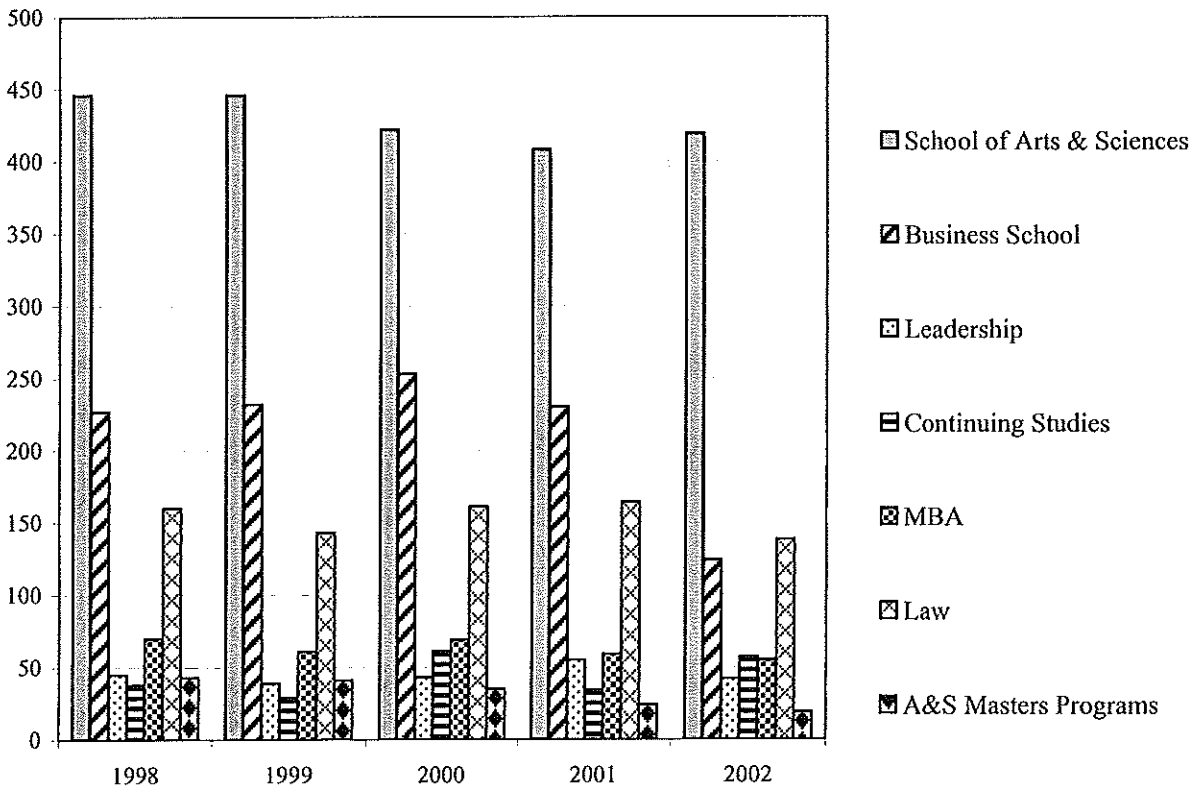

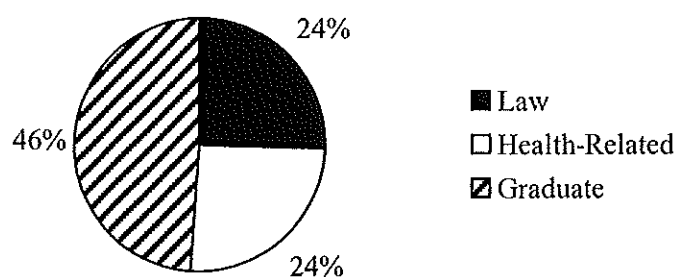

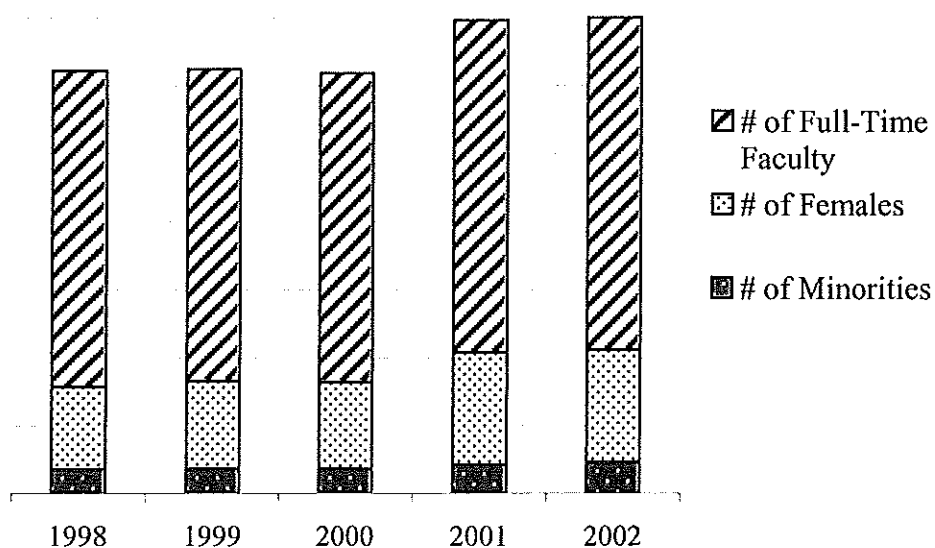

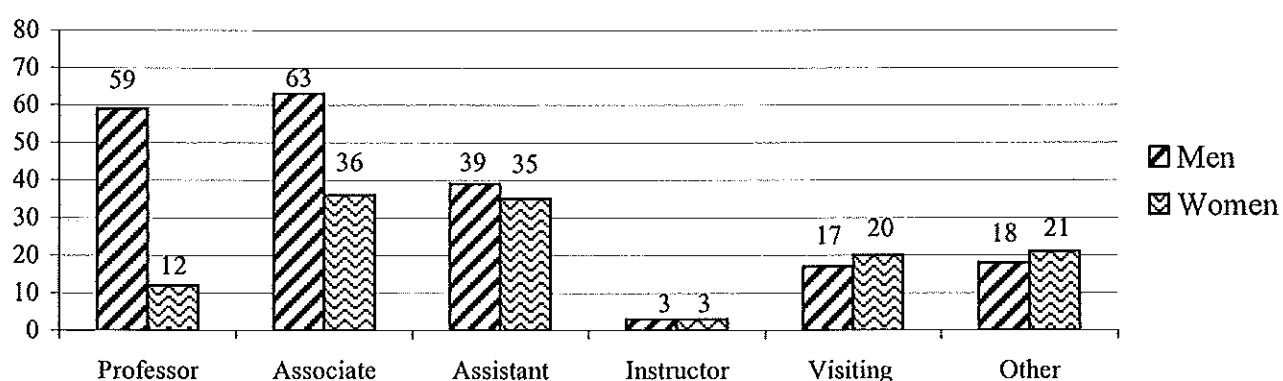

Full-Time Undergraduate Faculty by Gender, Fall 2002

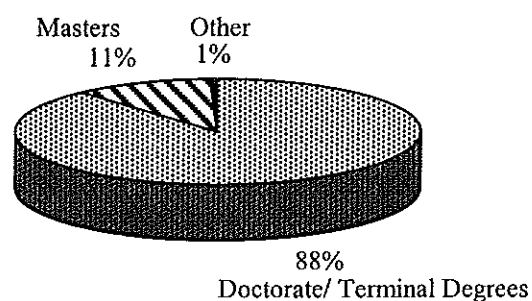

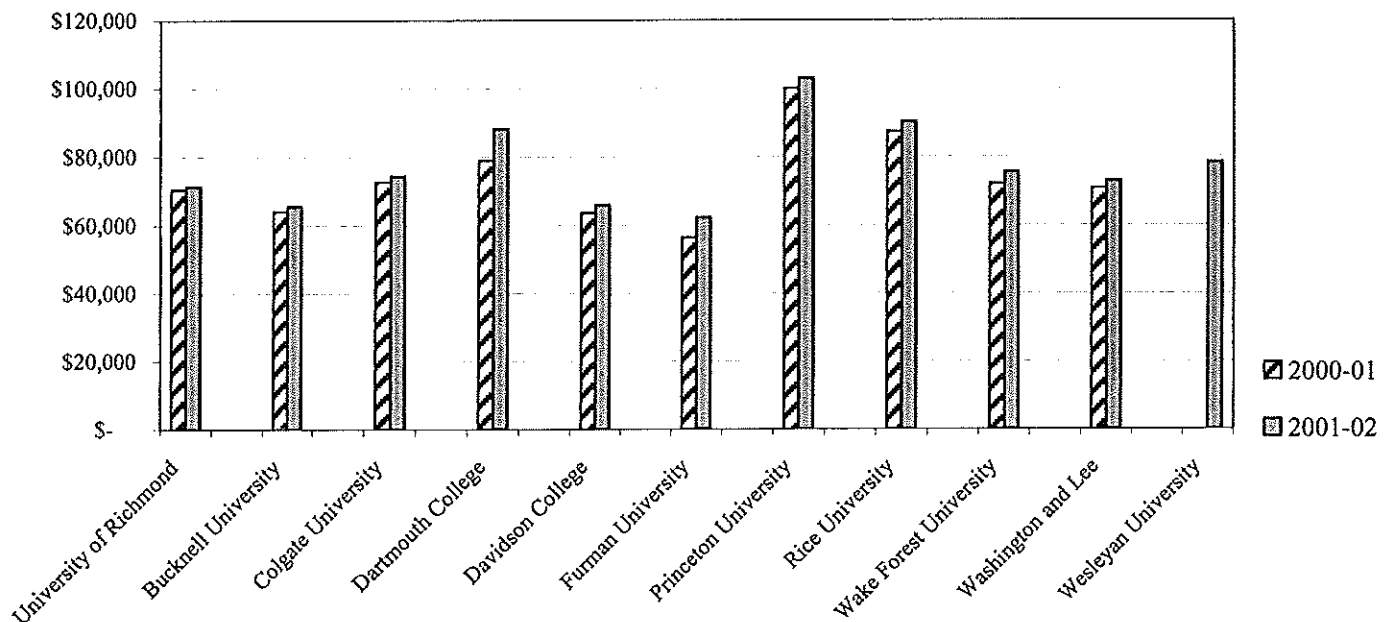

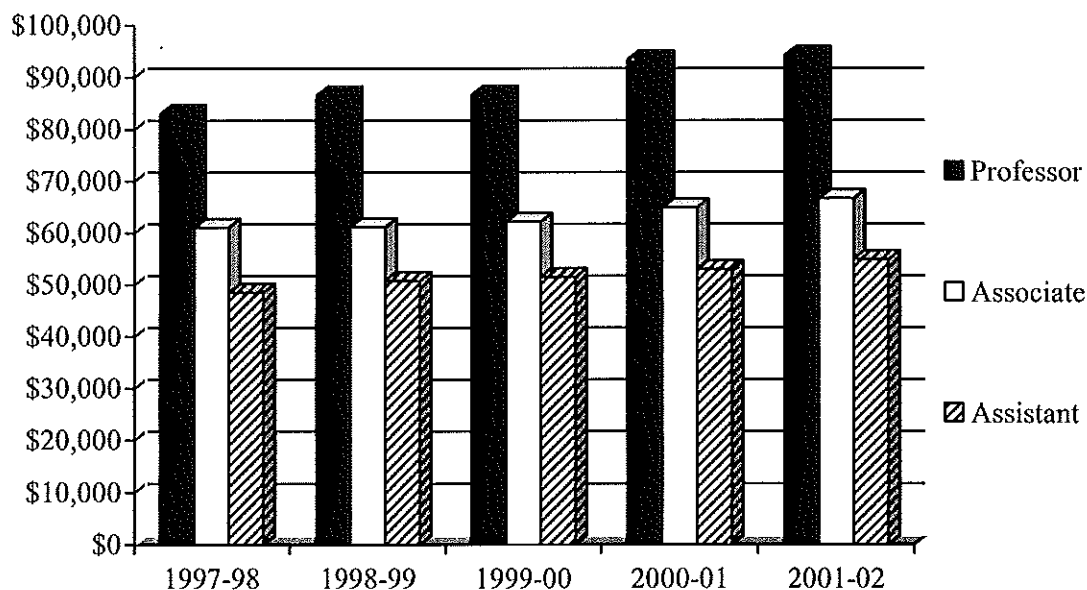

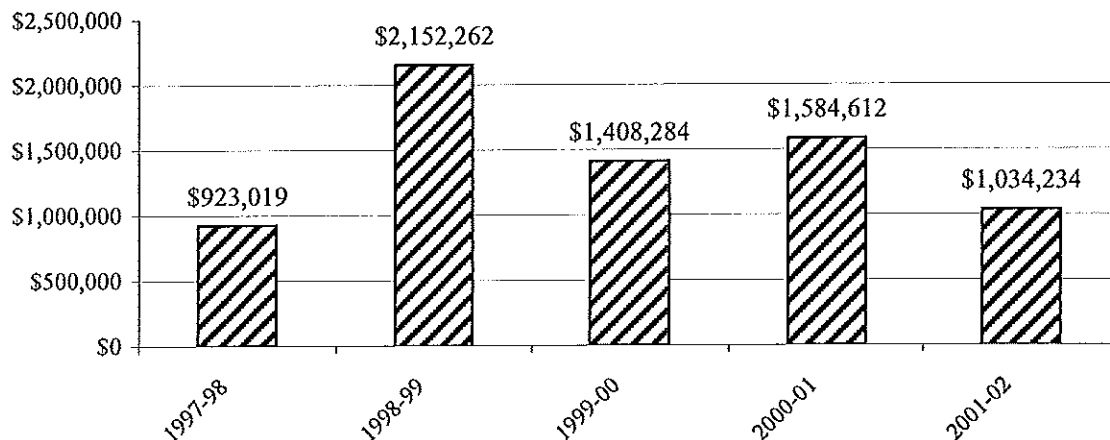
Dollars Received and Number of Applications Funded

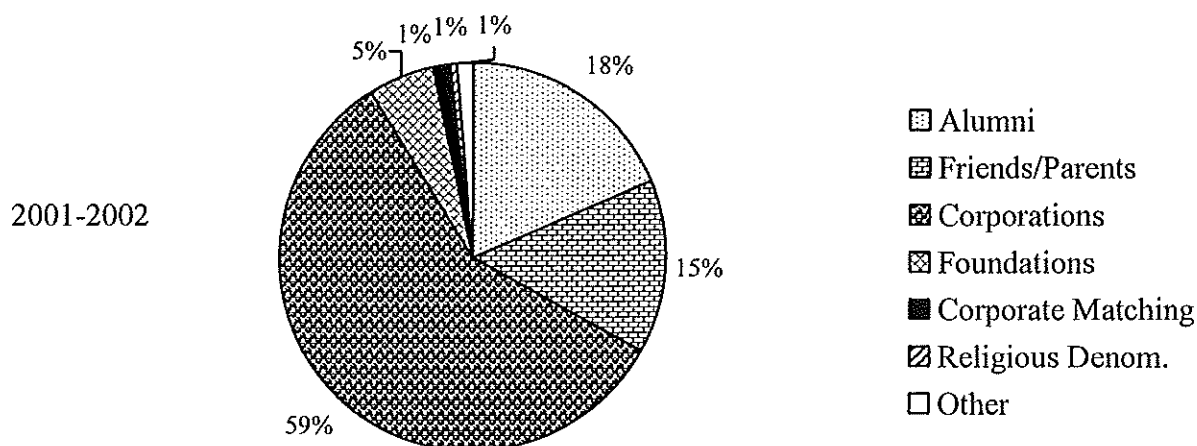

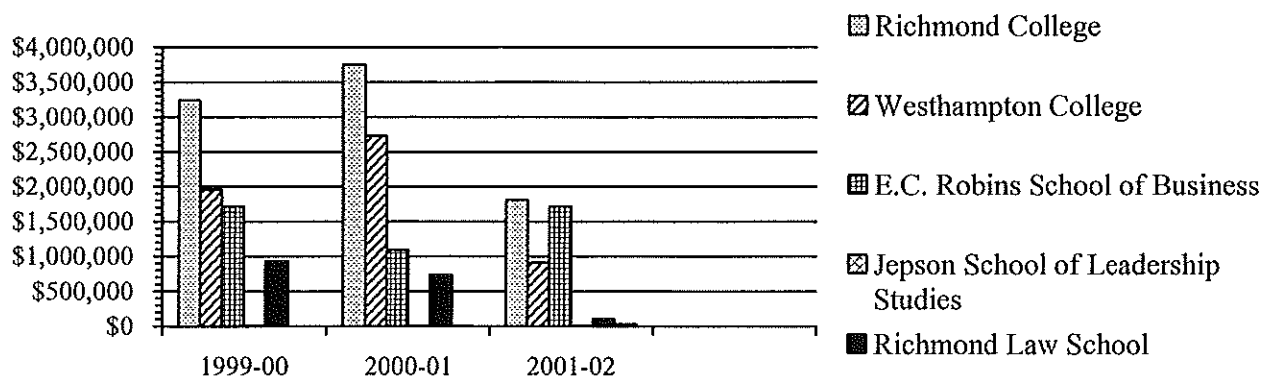

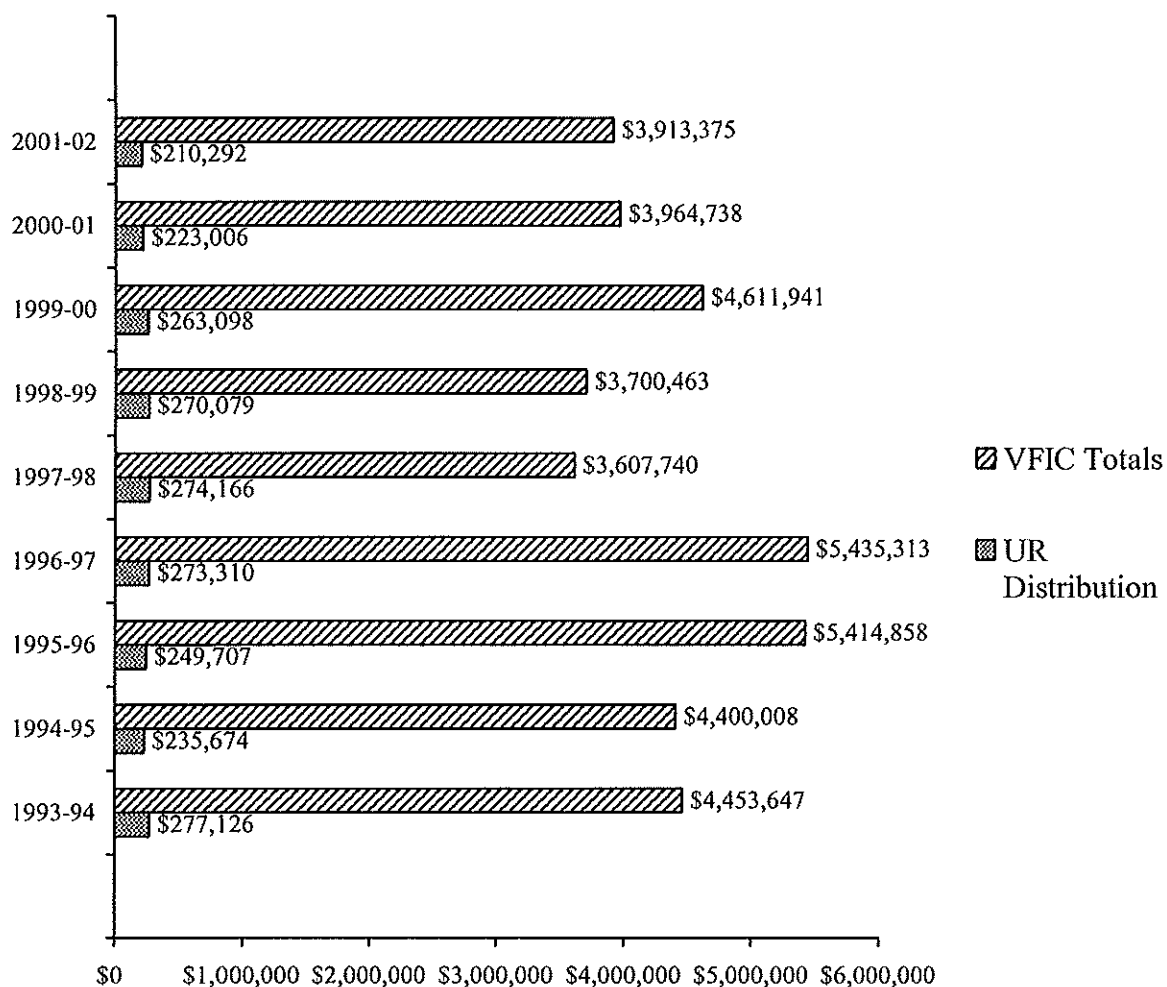


Alumni Giving 1999-2000 to 2001-2002

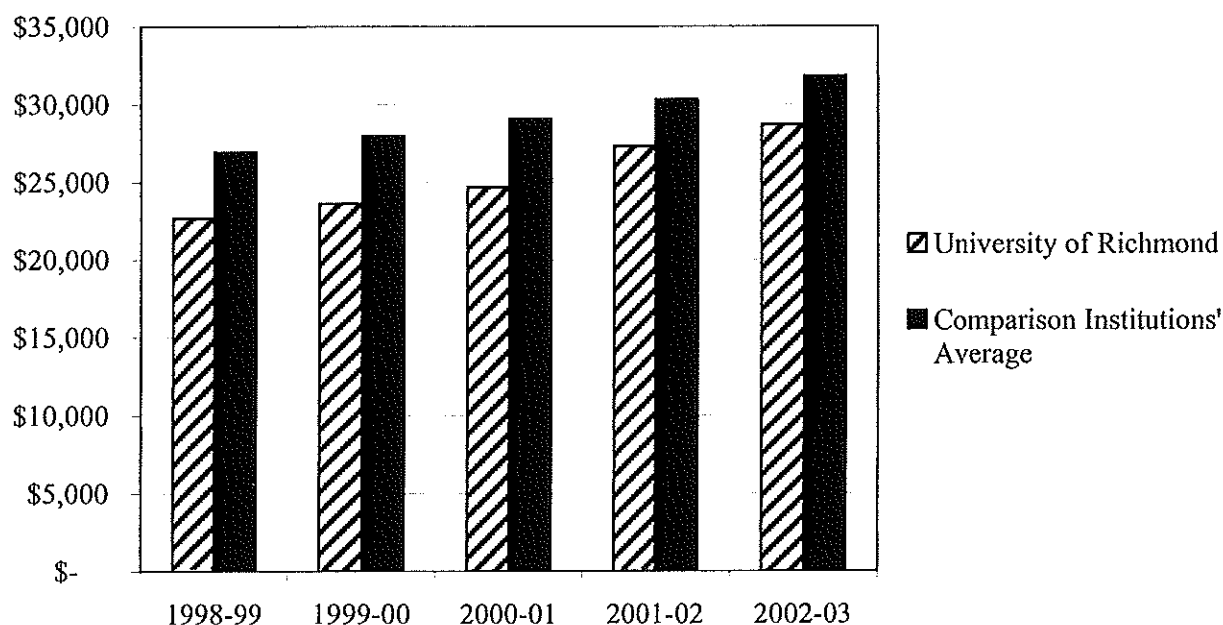

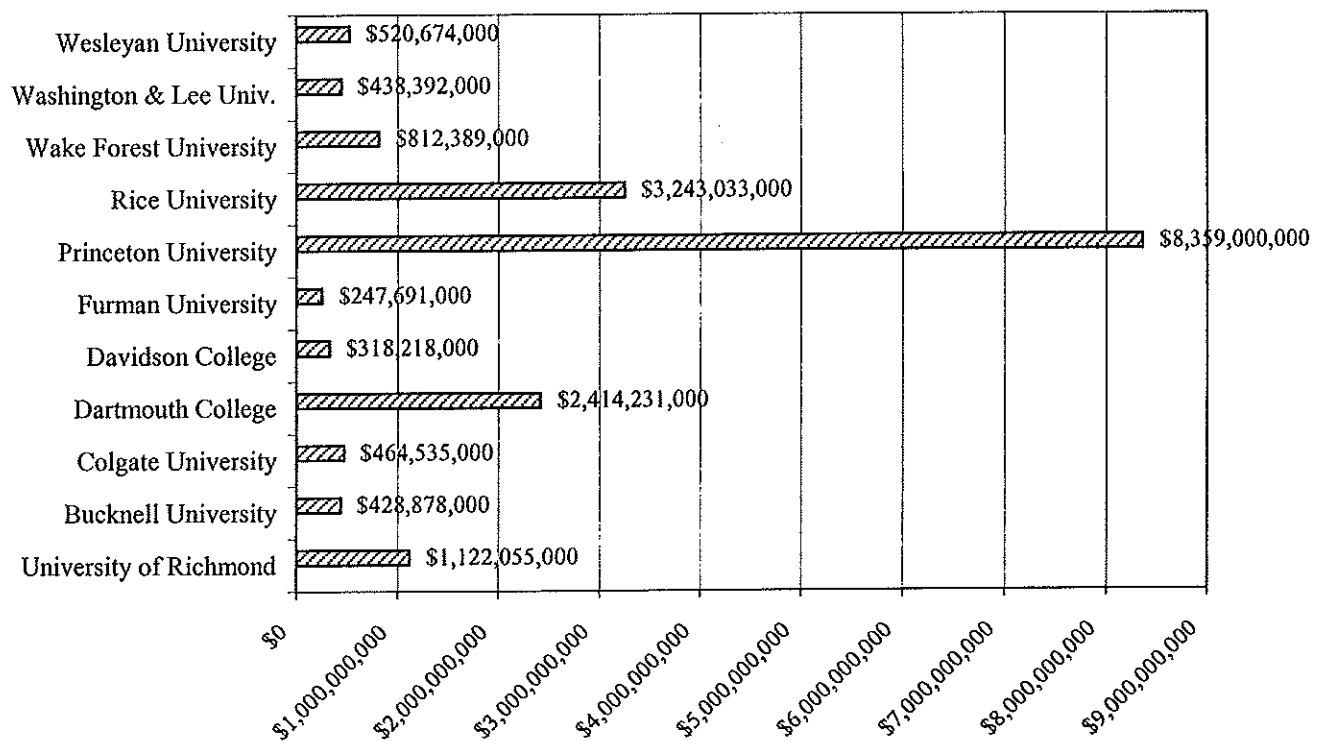
Comparison of University of Richmond Required Fees to Average of Other Institutions

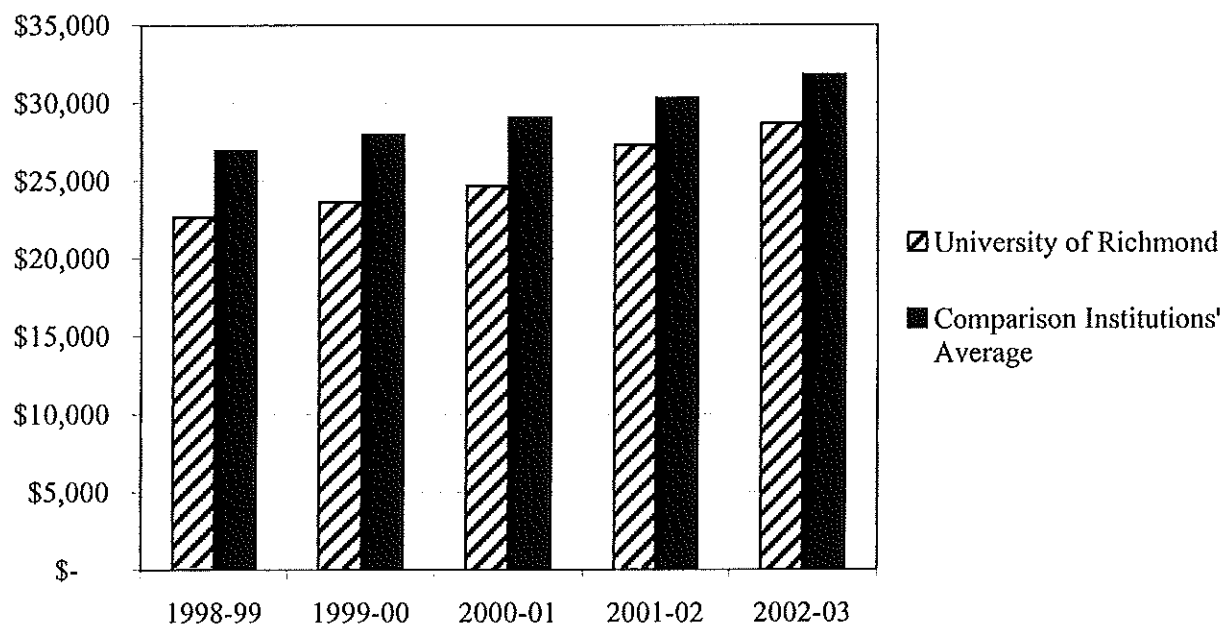
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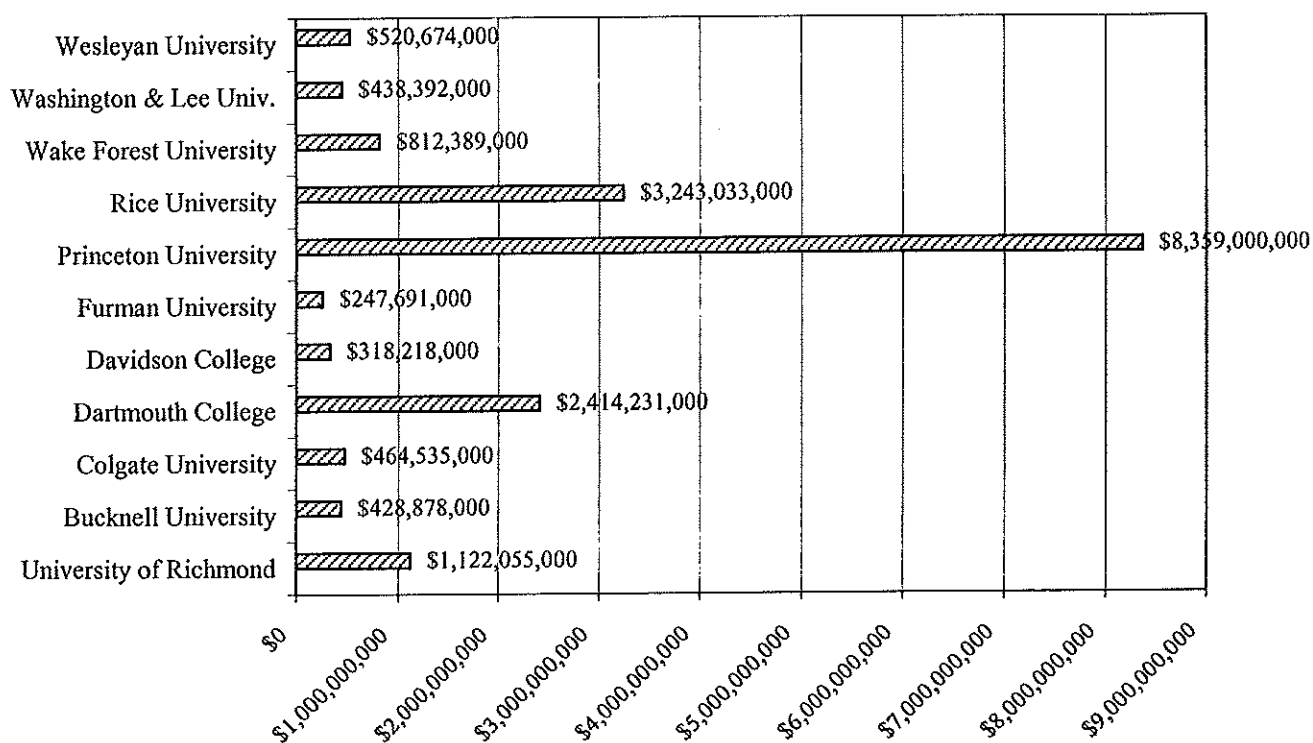
Comparison of University of Richmond Required Fees to Average of Other Institutions

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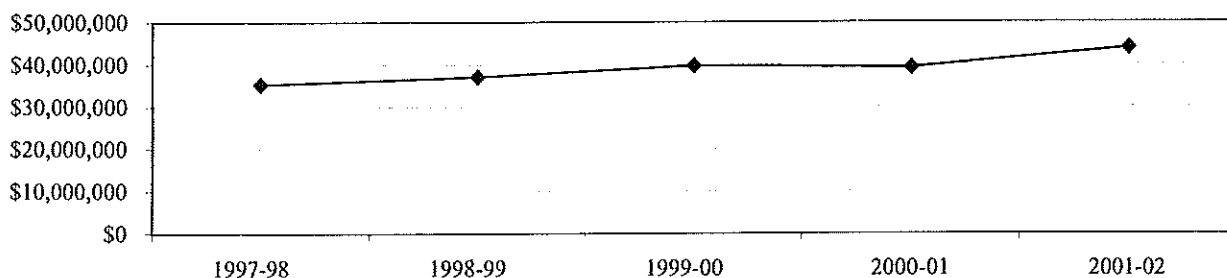
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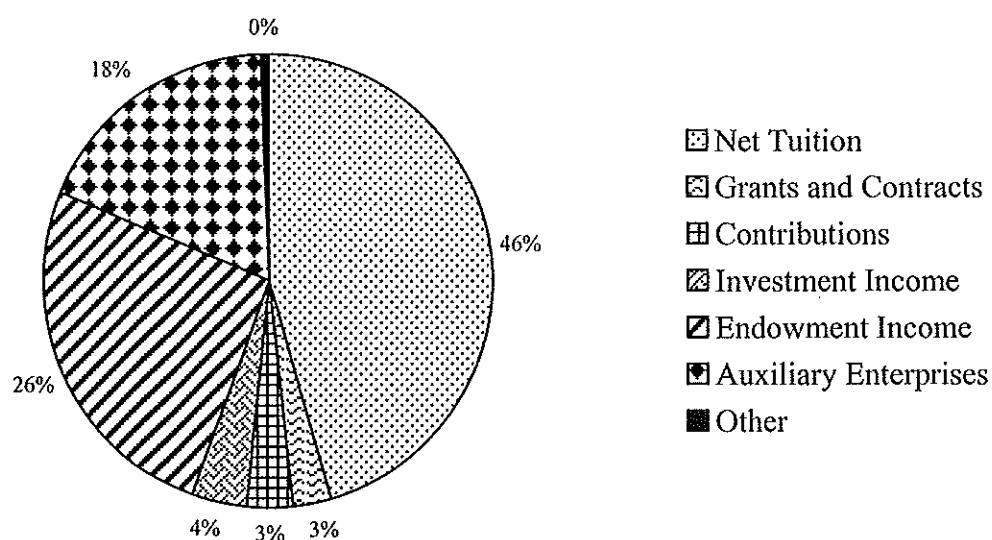
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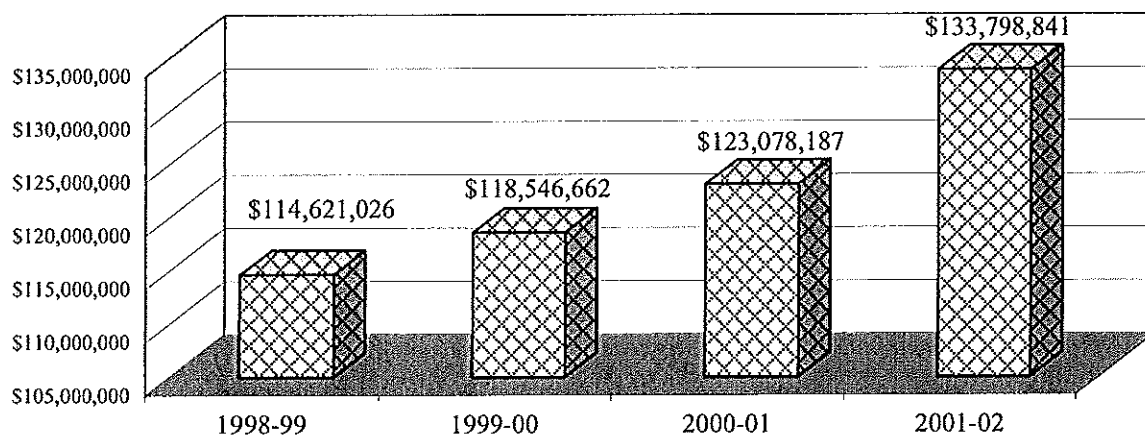


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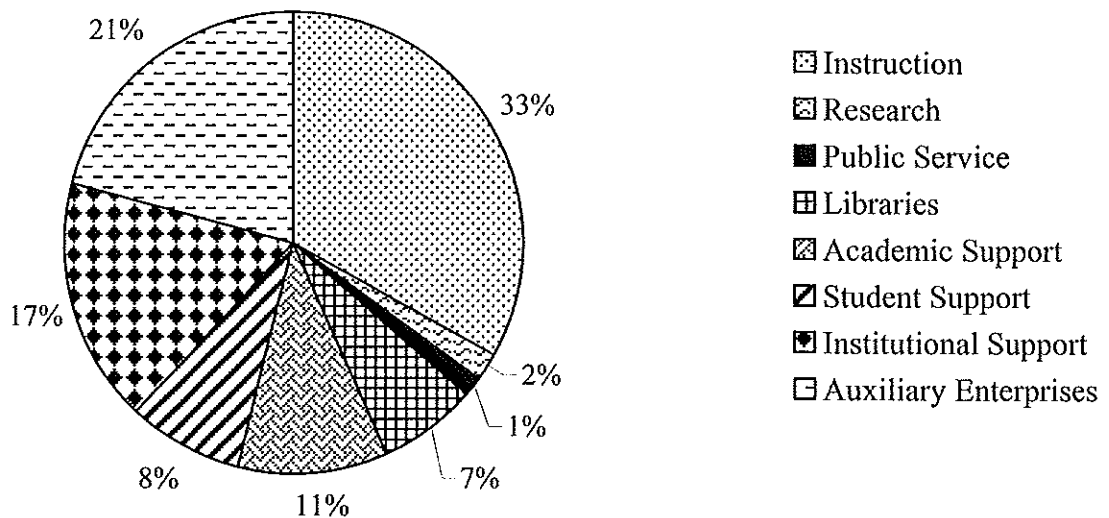


Total Operating Revenues, 1998-99 to 2001-02

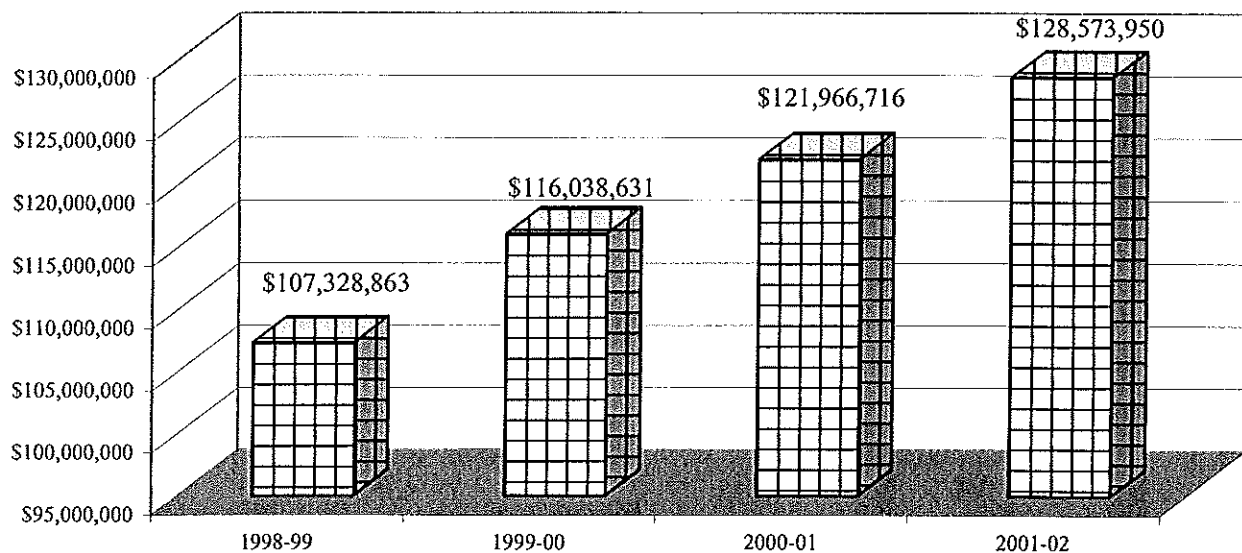


Operating Expenses, 2001-2002

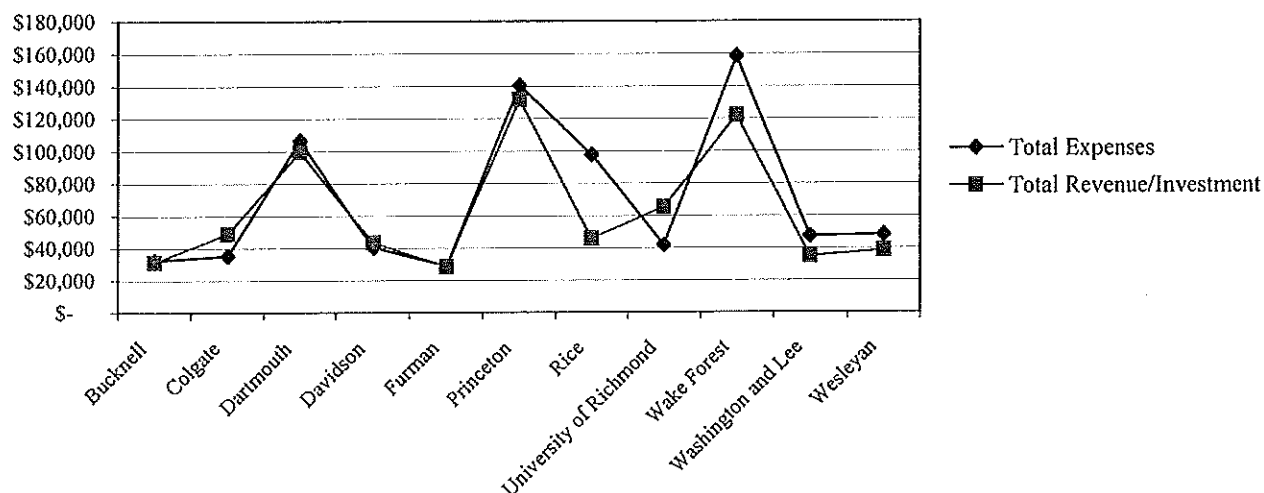
