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# Profile of the University

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## **Environment and History of University of Richmond**

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The campus consists of some fifty major buildings, of impressive Collegiate Gothic architectural style, set amid 350 acres of lawns, lakes, and woodlands. Richmond's history began almost two centuries ago with Richmond College, founded in 1830 by Virginia Baptists as a college of liberal arts and sciences for men. Around this nucleus were established the Richmond School of Law (1870); Westhampton College, a college of liberal arts and sciences for women (1914); the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, for advanced study in the liberal arts and sciences (1921); the Robins School of Business, for undergraduate and graduate study in business (1949); the School of Continuing Studies, for evening, summer, and continuing education (1962); and the Jepson School of Leadership Studies, the first school of leadership studies in the United States (1989). In 1990, the academic missions of Richmond College and Westhampton College were joined in a separate school, the School of Arts and Sciences. Richmond College and Westhampton College are the coordinate colleges for men and women respectively, providing special programming and leadership opportunities in student life.

Richmond benefits from a heritage of ethical and religious values, a residential character, and a commitment to liberal and general education opportunities through intimate schools and colleges joined into a substantial whole.

### **Mission Statement**

The mission of the University of Richmond is to sustain a collaborative learning and research community that supports the personal development of its members and the creation of new knowledge. A Richmond education prepares students to lead lives of purpose, thoughtful inquiry, and responsible leadership in a global and pluralistic society.

The educational objectives of the University are:

- to cultivate in students the interest, capacity, and skills necessary for independent intellectual inquiry and life-long learning;
- to convey to students a representative portion of that body of knowledge that has accumulated and endured through the history of world cultures;
- to encourage and aid students in the development of basic beliefs, values, and attitudes, including those of cooperation and tolerance;
- to assist students in selecting and preparing for careers and for study in graduate and professional schools;
- to foster in students personal habits that contribute to health and physical fitness.

## **Organizations and Accreditation**

Five academic schools and two coordinate colleges form the University of Richmond, with authority and responsibility vested legally in the Board of Trustees and the President of the University. The colleges and schools award no degrees individually, but all degrees for work completed in any one of them are conferred by the University of Richmond.

The University enrolls approximately 2,900 full-time undergraduates, 92% of whom live on campus; some 500 full-time law and graduates students; and 1300 part-time students, largely from Richmond and the surrounding community.

The University is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (1866 Southern Lane, Decatur, GA 30033-4097; Telephone 404-679-4500) to award associate, baccalaureate, master, and juris doctor degrees. The University is also certified by the Virginia State Board of Education to offer teacher licensure programs. Various departments and divisions have more specialized accreditation. Included in this category are the music program, accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music, and the chemistry program, accredited by the American Chemical Society. In addition, the Robins School of Business is accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business at the undergraduate and graduate levels, and the Richmond School of Law is accredited by the American Bar Association.

## **Common Ground Initiative**

The University of Richmond is committed to developing a diverse workforce and student body, and to modeling an inclusive campus community which values the expression of differences in ways that promote excellence in teaching, learning, personal development, and institutional success.

## **Profile of the University of Richmond**

### **Type of Institution**

- Private, independent, primarily undergraduate, highly selective, residential college, founded in 1830.

### **Academic Programs**

- School of Arts and Sciences, Robins School of Business, Jepson School of Leadership Studies, Richmond School of Law and School of Continuing Studies.

### **Location**

- Richmond, the historic capital of Virginia, with a population of approximately one million in the greater metropolitan area. The University maintains strong relationships with city, business, government and cultural agencies.

### **Faculty**

- 333 total full-time faculty at all ranks; 250 full-time faculty at the assistant level or above, 98 percent of whom hold a Ph.D. or terminal degree. (Fall 2004)

### **Student Body**

- 2,920 undergraduates; 765 masters and professionals.
- Undergraduate students come from 45 states, Washington, D.C., U.S. Virgin Islands, and 75 foreign countries.
- 50.5 percent women; 49.5 percent men; 15.2 percent underrepresented minorities.
- Undergraduate admissions profile: 5,780 applications for 775 places; middle 50% SAT scores: 1240–1390.  
Law School admissions profile: 2,203 applications for 171 places; middle 50% LSAT scores: 160-163.
- 583 part-time and 219 full-time students enrolled in the School of Continuing Studies.

### **Student-Faculty Ratio**

- 10:1, full-time undergraduate divisions.

### **Degrees and Majors**

- 59 majors, 43 minors and 14 concentrations in the School of Arts and Sciences, Robins School of Business, and Jepson School of Leadership Studies; 3 master's degrees in 5 programs within the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences; and an M.B.A. program in the Robins School of Business.
- The Richmond School of Law offers dual degree programs in law/health administration, law/social work, and law/urban studies and planning in conjunction with Virginia Commonwealth University; dual degrees in law/business administration in cooperation with the School of Business; and law/master programs in cooperation with the School of Arts and Sciences.
- The School of Continuing Studies offers 7 programs at the bachelor's and associate's levels, 9 at the certificate level, 2 graduate certificates, 2 master's programs and 11 minors in addition to numerous non-credit offerings.
- The university awards the following degrees: B.A., B.S., B.S.B.A., B.A.S., B.L.A., J.D., M.A., M.S., M.L.A., M.B.A., M.D.S. and M.H.R.M.

**Student Life**

- Coordinate colleges (Richmond College for men and Westhampton College for women) with five undergraduate student government associations and approximately 250 student organizations offering leadership opportunities.
- 92 percent of undergraduate students live on campus all four years.
- 8 fraternities and 8 sorority organizations (6 National Panhellenic Conference organizations; 2 recognized National Panhellenic Council organizations).
- The Recreation and Wellness program involves 90 percent of men and women each year.

**Athletics**

- Division I athletic program offering 9 sports for men and 10 for women.
- Major conference affiliation is the Atlantic 10 for all sports except for women's golf, which has a conference association with the Colonial Athletic Association.

**Chaplaincy Program**

- *Spiritual Care*: weekly worship in Chapel and Burhans Interreligious Prayer room for Christians, Jews, Muslims, Hindus and Buddhists; pastoral care and counseling for students, faculty and staff of all faiths and no faith; web outreach including podcasts and prayer blog.
- *Interreligious Community and Justice Program*: community building by, between and among 15 religious and spiritual life organizations representing six faith groups; speakers, panels, films, and discussions addressing an annual theme (2005 – 2006: "What Does Religion Have to Do with Violence?").
- *Bonner Scholars Program*: oversight of 100 students engaged in 10 hours/week of service, summer service and extended learning requirements.
- *Education and Outreach*: community service volunteers; diversity programming; Habitat for Humanity; university-wide Build-It program; In My Back Yard awards; collaboration with faculty and schools around topics of shared concern.

### **Libraries**

- The University of Richmond Libraries: F. W. Boatwright Memorial Library, which houses materials for the humanities, social sciences and leadership studies. It also contains the Business Information Center, Media Resources Center, and Science Information Center. The Parsons Music Library collection is located in the Modlin Center for the Arts.
- Holdings for University of Richmond Libraries: 464,615 printed books; 45,473 electronic books; 534,847 government documents on paper/micro/CD; 43,747 serial subscriptions; 103,623 bound periodicals; 87,148 microforms; 16,035 music scores; and 20,209 multimedia materials; and 120,500 electronic reproductions of 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup>-century books. The libraries are U.S. Government Document depositories.
- William Taylor Muse Law Library holdings: 364,065 total volumes; 156,169 total titles; 4,509 serial subscriptions; 4,273 active serial titles.

- 42,205 alumni residing across the nation and internationally. 51% percent currently reside in Virginia.
- 29 percent of alumni solicited contributed in 2004–2005.
- New commitments for 2004–2005 totaled \$28.1 million.
- The total amount raised for the *Transforming Bright Minds* campaign: \$171.1 million as of 9/7/05 toward the goal of \$200 million by 2008.

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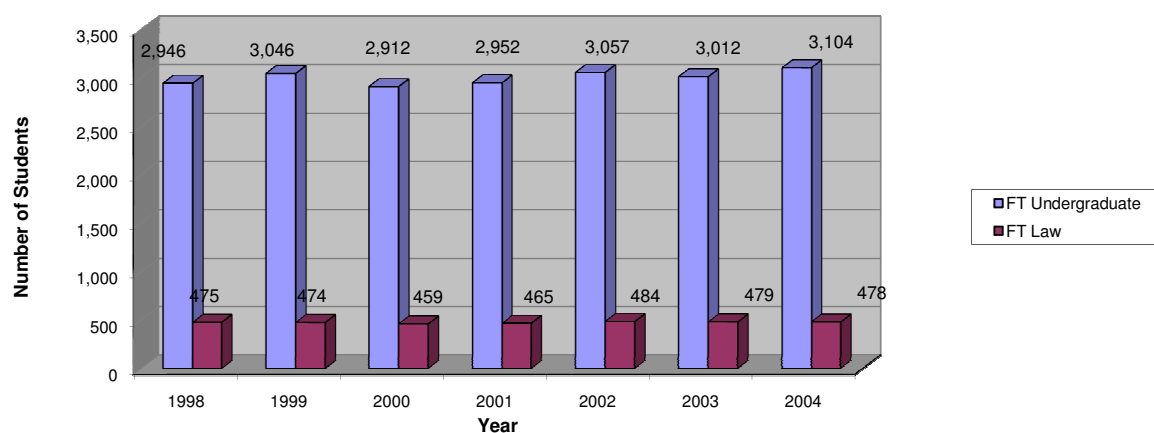

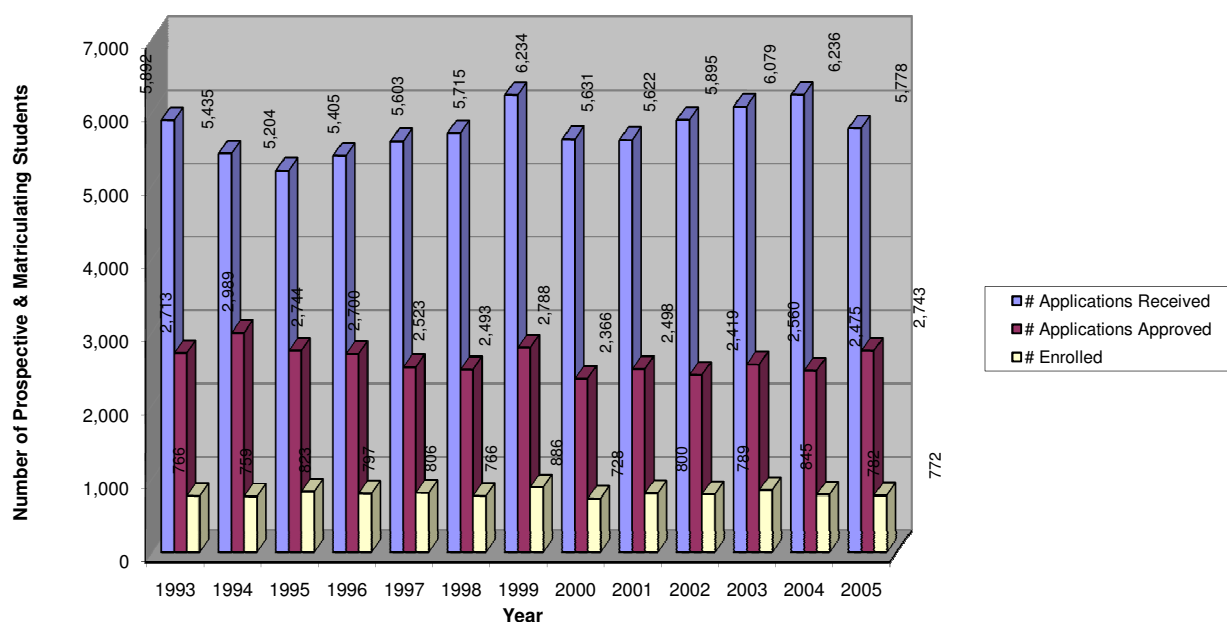
**Number of Full-Time Undergraduate Students Compared to Number of Full-Time Law Students from 1998-2004**

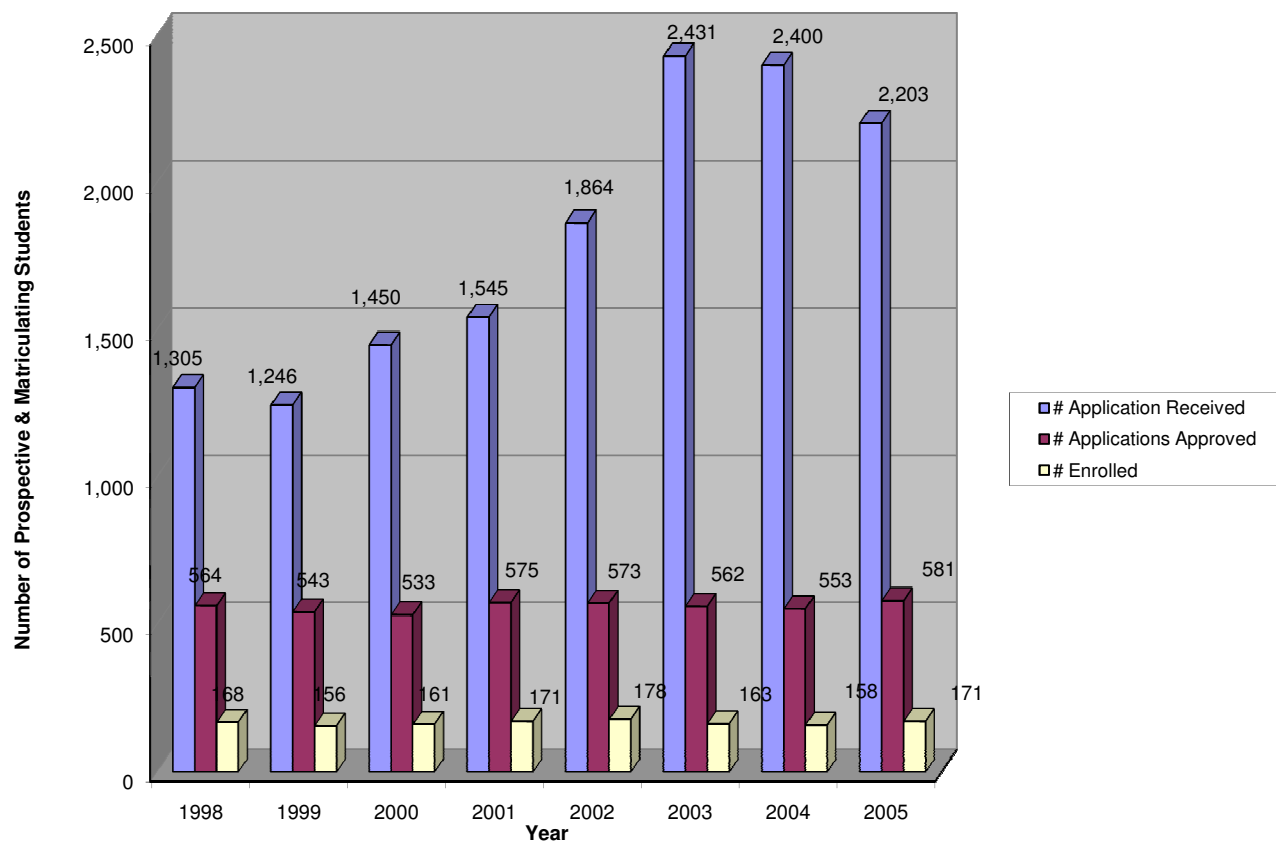

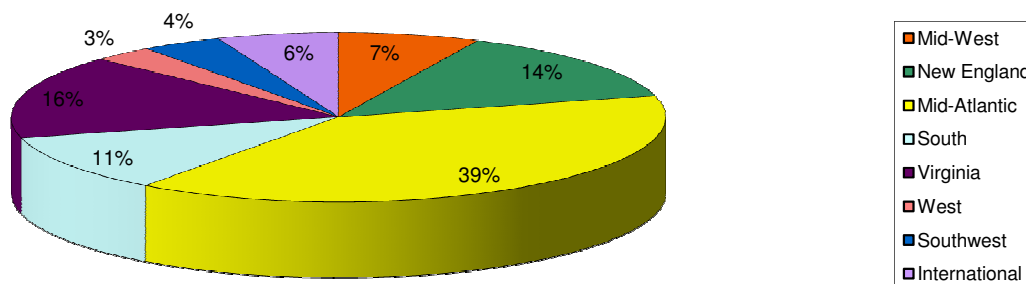
## **Fall Law Admissions 1998-2005**

Geographic Distribution of Undergraduate Students 2004-2005



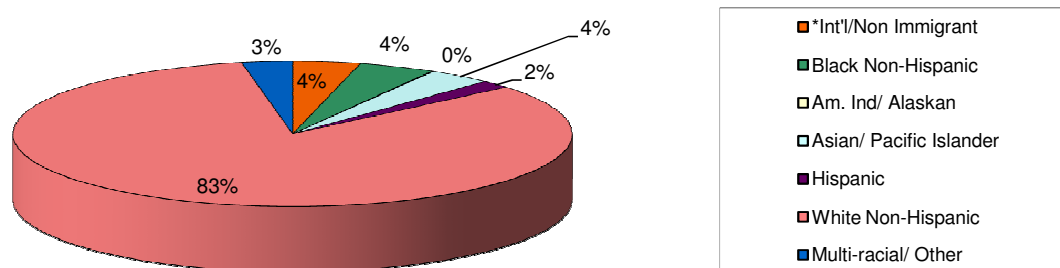

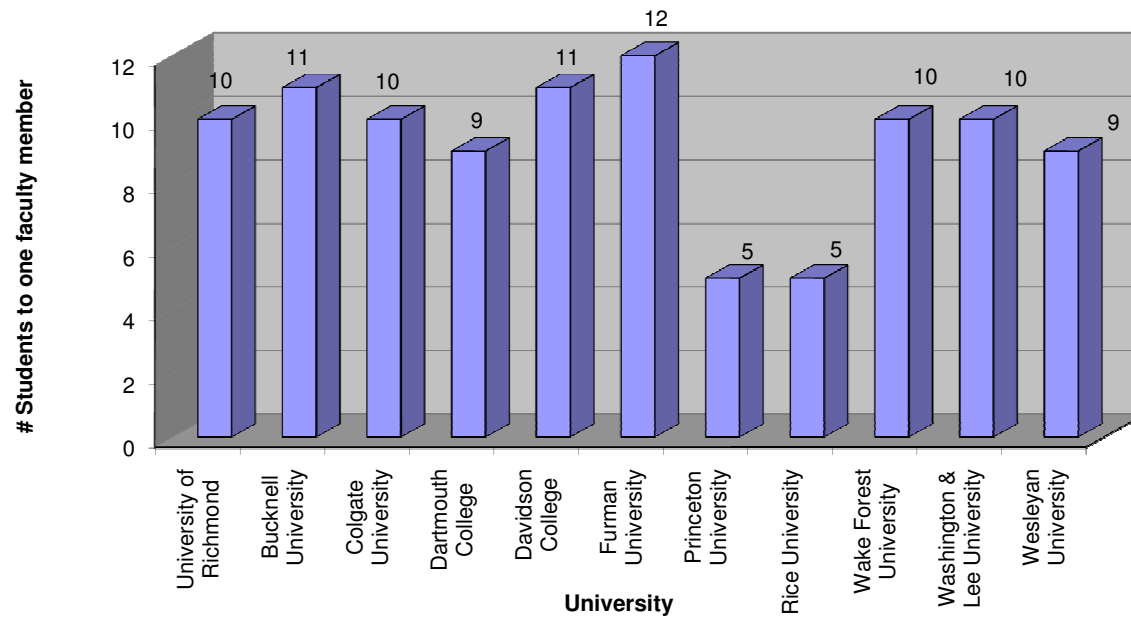
2004 Enrollment by Ethnic Groups



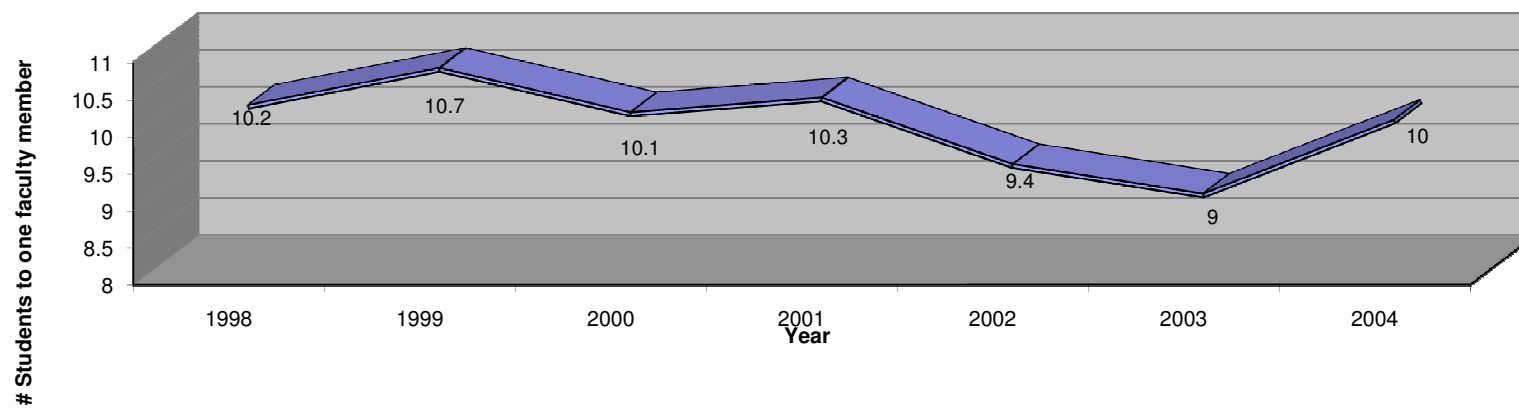

**University of Richmond Student/Faculty Ratios: Fall 1998-2004**

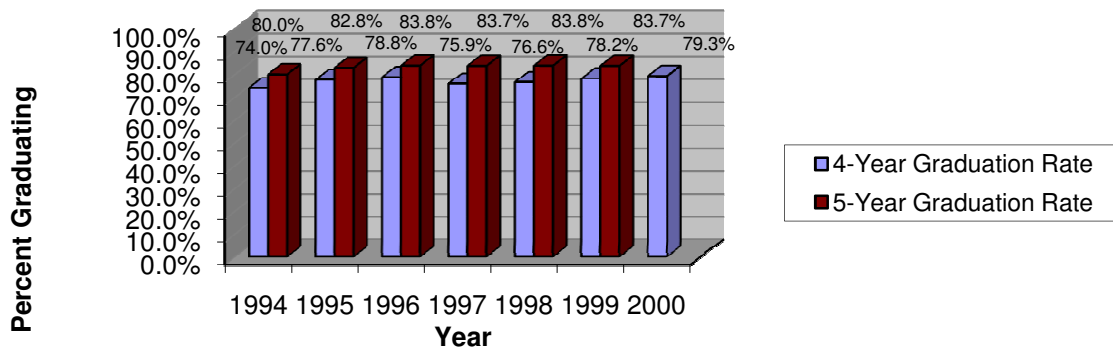

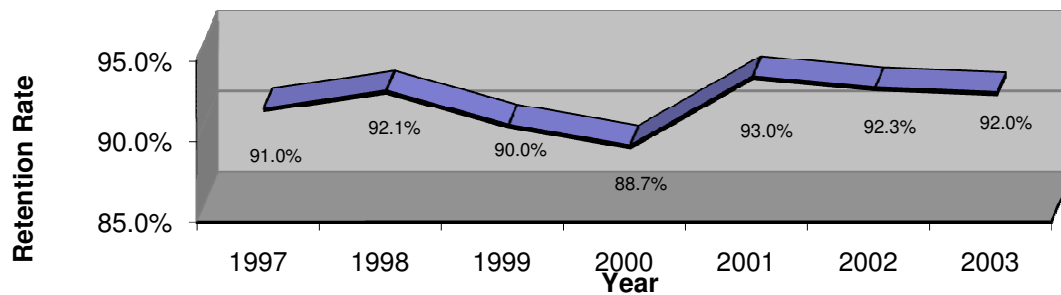

### First Year Student Retention Rate, 1997-2003



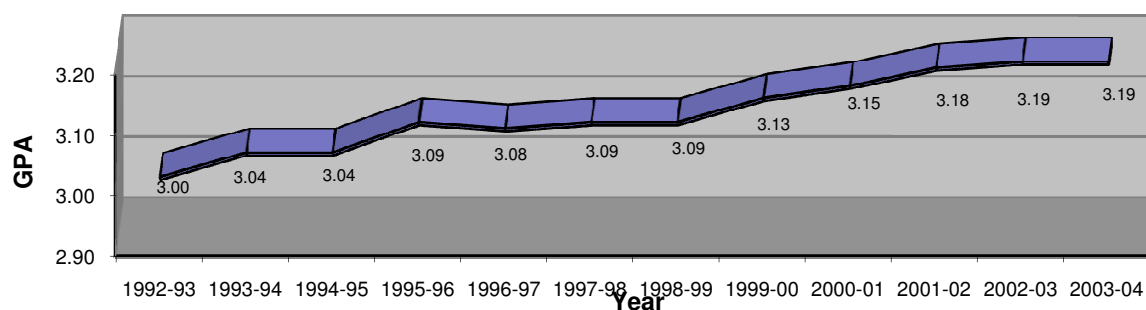

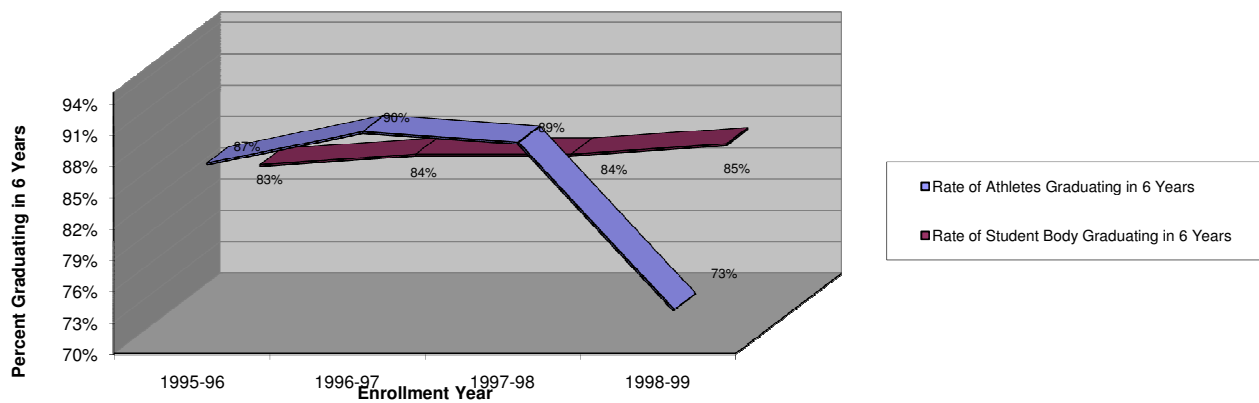

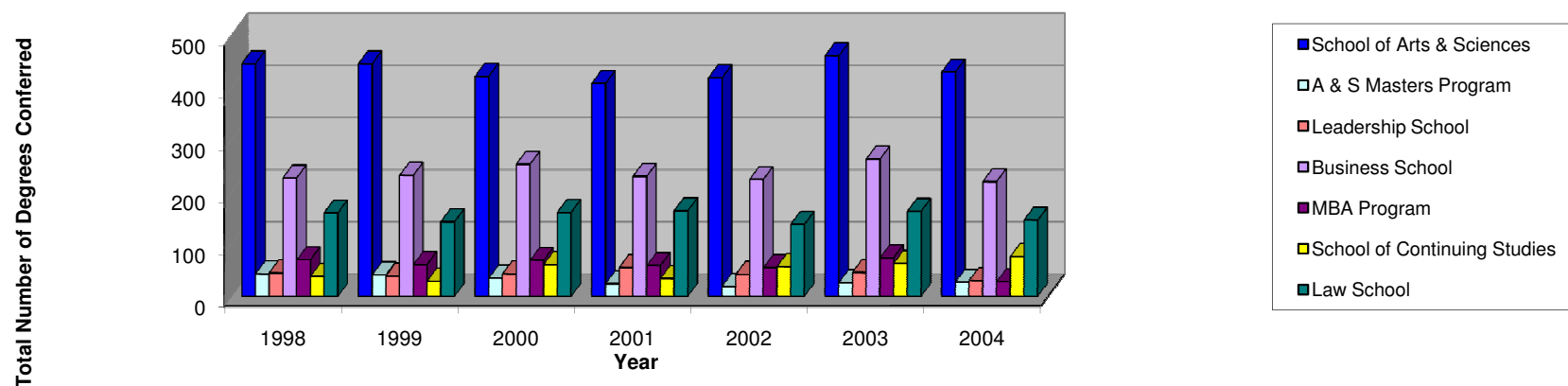

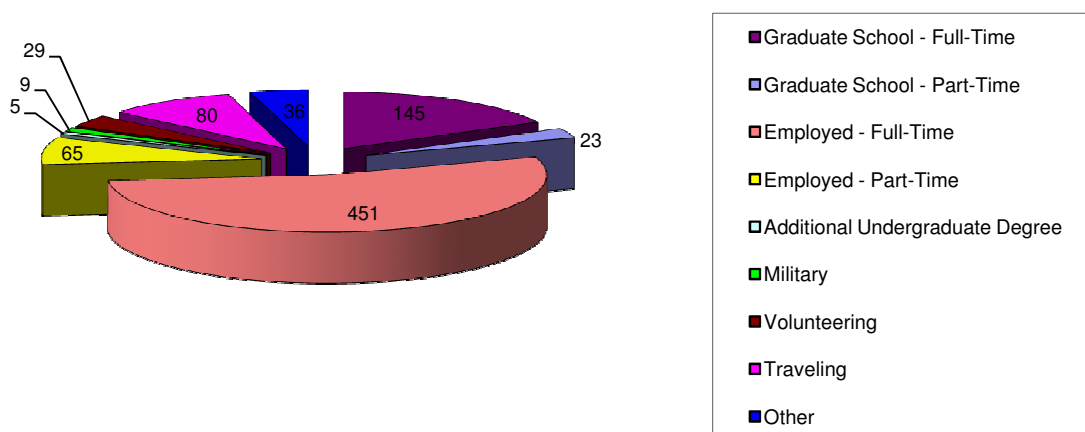
# Total Number of Degrees Conferred, 1998-2004



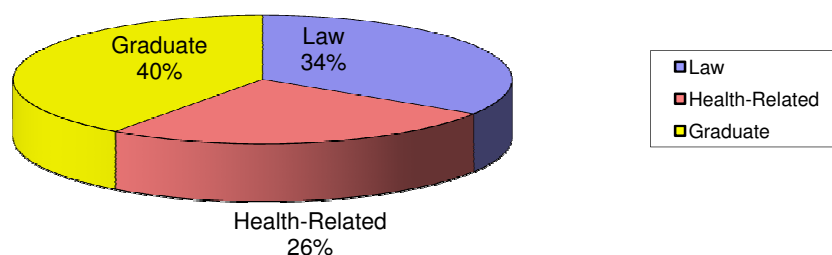

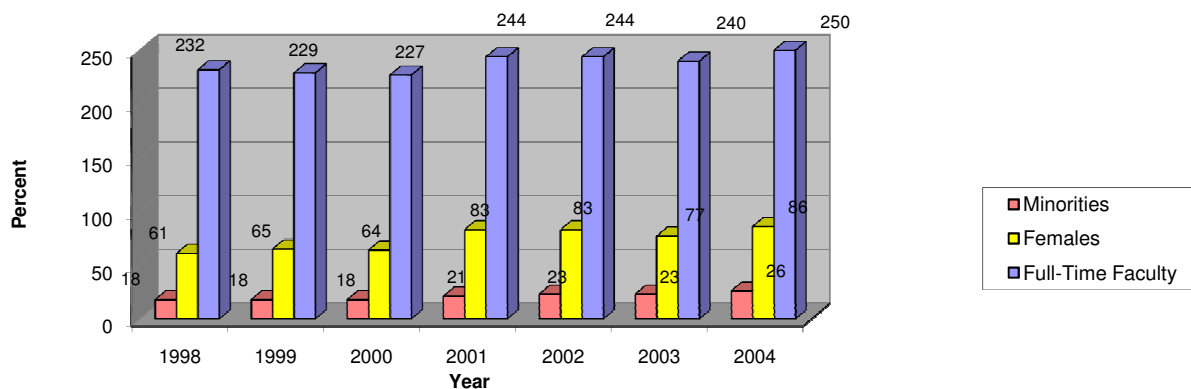

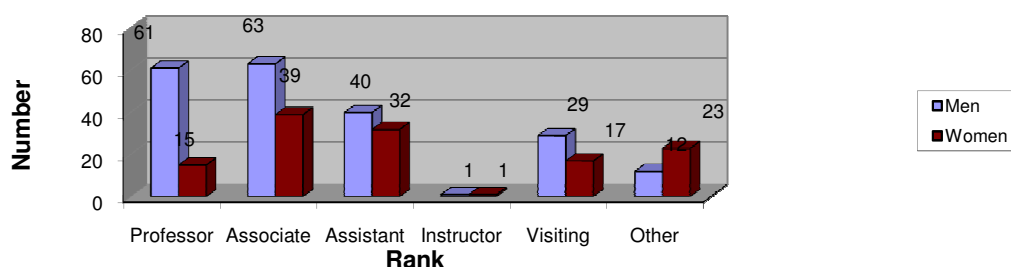

### Headcount of Full-Time Undergraduate Faculty by Gender, Fall 2004



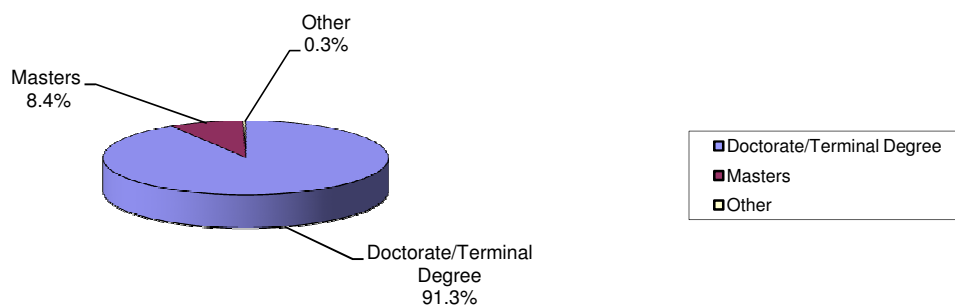

### Full-Time Faculty Degrees, Fall 2004 (all ranks)





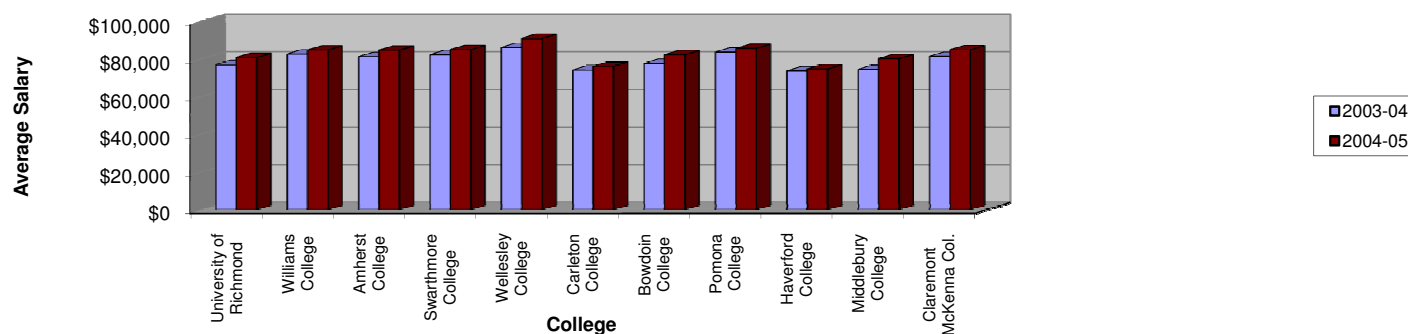

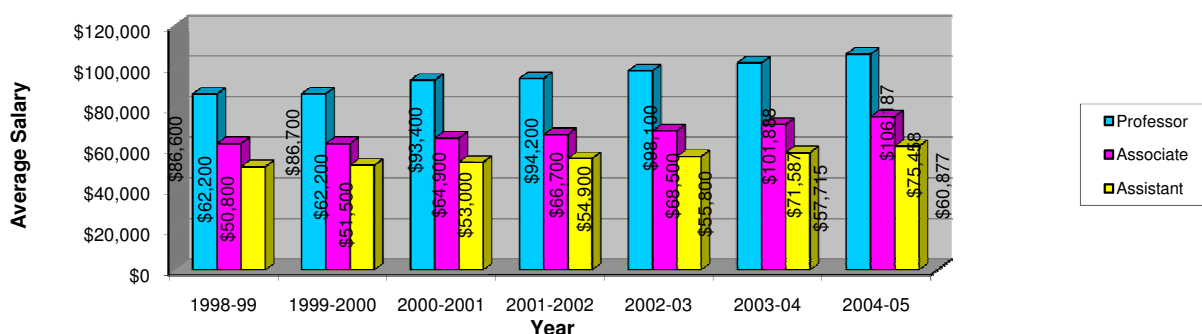

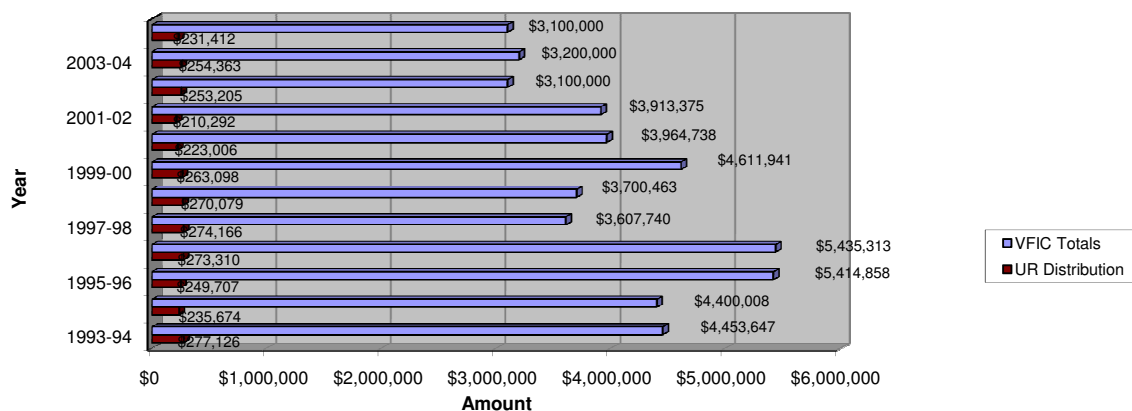

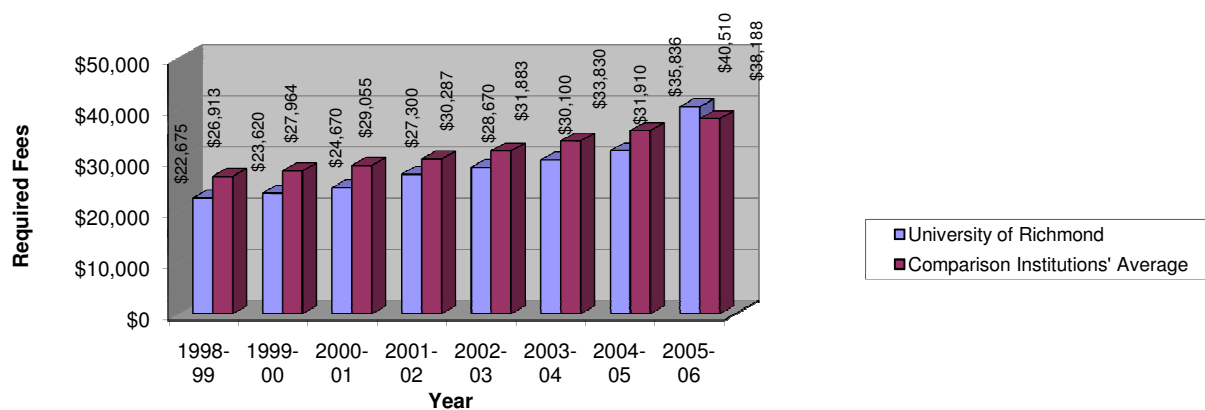

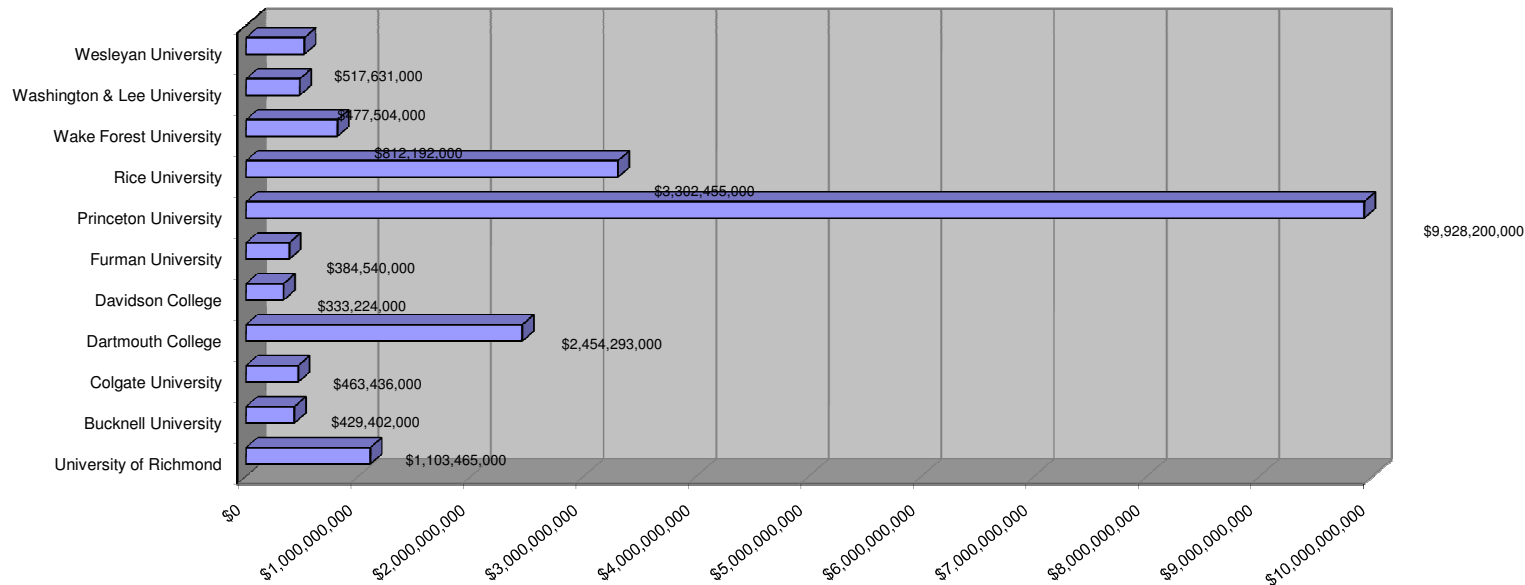
**Comparison of University of Richmond Required Fees to Average of Other Institutions**

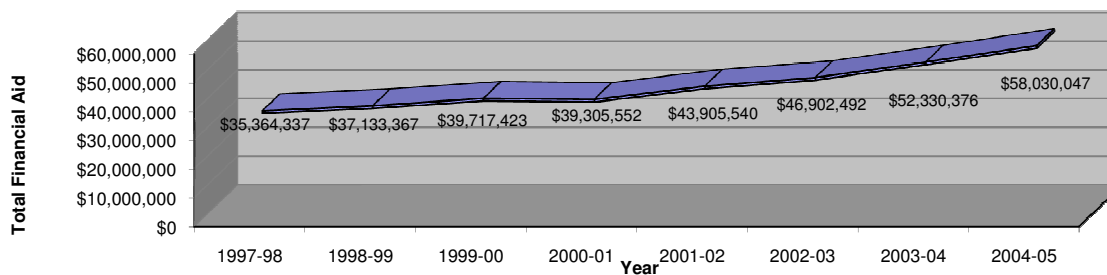

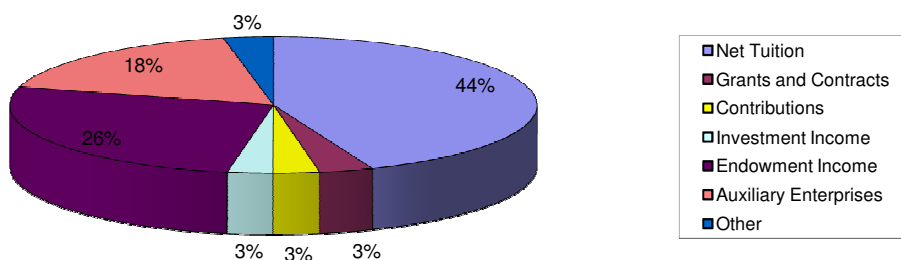
Total Financial Aid, 1997-98 to 2004-05

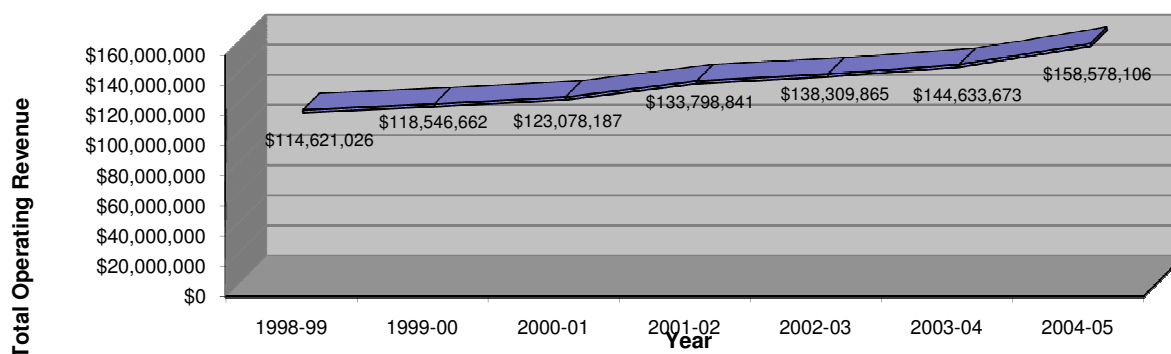

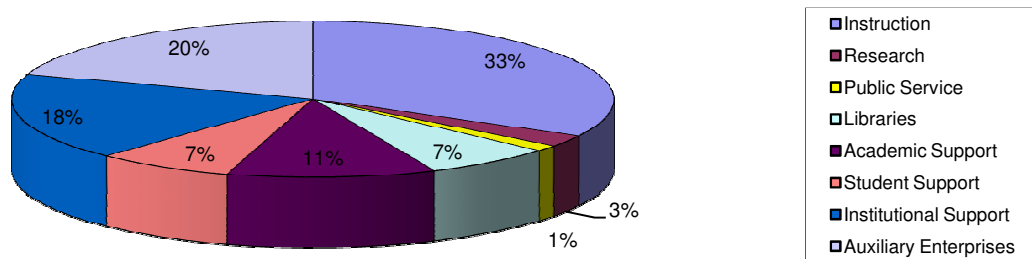
Total Operating Revenues, 1998-99 to 2004-05

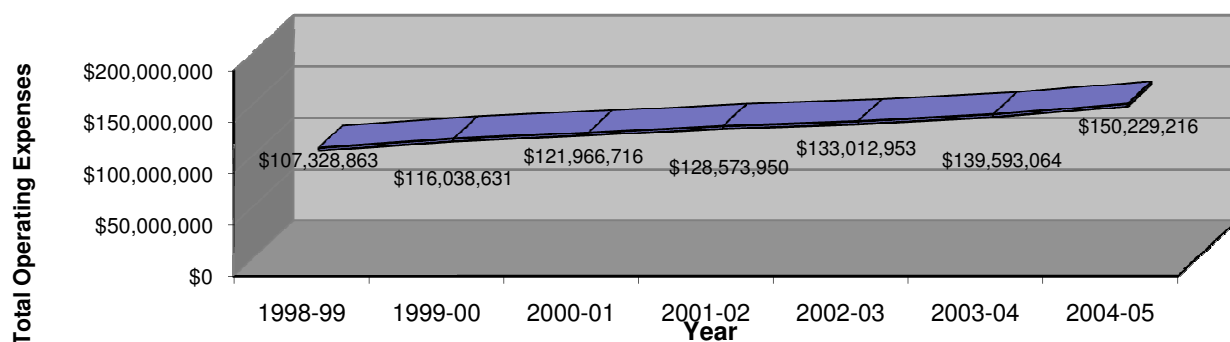
